January 1—President Sukarno of Indonesia lays claim to Dutch West New Guinea.

January 16—Eight killed in natural gas pipeline explosion at Edson, Alta. U.S. and European Common Market at Brussels agree to seek tariff reductions on each side.

January 21—Tim Buck resigns as Canadian Communist party leader at Toronto convention.

January 25—Texas expert Red Blair puts out week-old oil well fire near Fort St. John B.C.

January 29—Geneva conference on possible nuclear test ban ends in failure.

February 3—President Kennedy announces embargo on U.S. trade with Cuba except for some foods and medicines.

February 5—Jamaica follows Trinidad in withdrawal from West Indies Federation.

February 10—U.S. Air Force pilot Gary Powers exchanged by Russians in Berlin for Soviet spy Col. Rudolf Abel who had been in U.S. prison.

February 16—Riding and fires at Georgetown, British Guiana, kill six, property damage \$200,000.

February 18—Eisenhower resigns from New Democratic Party.

February 20—U.S. astronaut John Glenn orbits earth three times.

February 26—Algerian Communist leaders approve cease fire.

March 1—Nehru's Congress party retains majority in India elections.

March 12—Diefenbaker tells Commons nine Canadians with Indochina truce commissioned involved in gold and opium smuggling.

Two highly respected members of pioneer families of Jarvis and South Norfolk districts celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary on Christmas Day when they were entertained at the home of Mr. Brock's sister, Miss Stella Brock of Port Dover.

Mr. Brock who was born in Charlottetown in August 1886, the son of the late George E. Brock and Phoebe Matthews, was one of a family of six of whom only two survive. He is the fourth generation of his family to live in the Jarvis district.

Mr. Brock, who was formerly Miss Ethel J. Thompson of Victoria, was born in 1886, the second daughter of the late E. N. and Emily Overholt Thompson, and is the last survivor of a family of three.

Married at Victoria on December 23rd, 1912 by the Rev. Ralph Snodgrass of the Baptist Church, they farmed near Nanticoke and in Townsend until moving to their present home just west of Jarvis on No. 3 Highway some fourteen years ago, where Mr. Brock was employed by the Department of Highways until retirement.

Since which time he has been devoted to his garden.

Mr. Brock delights to reminisce about the earlier days in which he was a member of the 38th Regiment of Militia and took part in the annual colourful pageant of camp at Niagara-on-the-Lake. His family being related to the hero of the War of 1812-16, General Sir Isaac Brock.

During his earlier years Mr. Brock with his brother constructed many fine barn buildings which still stand in this district, among which were Ivey's, Biggar's, Dougherty's, Doser's, Elliott's and many others.
