





TELEPHONE FACILITIES **EXPANDED IN JARVIS**

Another year of expansion in telephone facilities in Jarvis reflected a similar situation throughout the territory of The Bell Telephone Company of Canada during 1962, it was revealed in the company's 83rd annual report issued this week.

Expansion of facilities and improvement of basic service required expenditures of \$219,400,000 in its operating territory of Quebec, Ontario and Labrador.

It is the largest amount ever spent on construction during any year in the company's history.

Telephones in service at the end of 1962 totalled 3,890,630, an increase of 195,523 during the year.

This wide-scale expansion was also present in Jarvis with the addition of 11 telephones, D. A. McArthur, Bell manager for this region said, totalling 679 in service here as of December 31. Net income in 1962 totalled \$85,285,000, equivalent to \$2.66 per share or a return of 6.3 per cent of invested capital.

Dividends to the company's \$2,854 shareholders amounted to \$35,968,000, leaving \$11,317,000 as retained earnings. At the end of 1962, 97.3 per cent of the shareholders, owning 93 per cent of the total stock, resided in Canada.

As of December 31, Bell employed 35,036 men and women. The company's payroll for the year was \$170,470,796.
