The March Meeting of Jarvis Public School Board was held on Monday evening, March 4th, at 8 P.M. in the school with members absent, Don Duxbury presiding. Principal Garrett

reported on the Inter-School Sports Program. A new filing cabinet has been placed in the school with the condition of the boiler which had been cleaned during the month.

The secretary presented the finalized budget which had been under consideration at an earlier meeting. The mill rate is considerably reduced as no major expenditures are anticipated this year. Very large

repairs have been necessary for the past three years and it is felt that the school is in good shape for some time. The secretary and a number of trustees will attend the Rural School Board Banquet and Annual Meeting at Kobbler School on O.E.A. in Toronto during Easter week.

Bills were examined for payment and adjustment was declared.

In his report the Director, Richard Priestman, stated that the work of the Staff had increased greatly in the past year. He reviewed the application of trained workers which called for study by the Personnel Committee.

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CAPACITY CROWD ATTENDS PARIS LIBERAL RALLY

Last Tuesday night despite a heavy fog over six hundred and thirty people crowded into the Agricultural Hall at Paris to hear Paul Martin and meet the Liberal Party. Speaking on the agricultural problems of the Eastern farmer Mr. Pennell stressed the need for a program designed to increase the per capita consumption of dairy products. One of the ways this could be encouraged, he said, was by the introduction of a free milk program in our schools. Mr. Pennell went on to point out that with more research and closer co-operation between the dairy industry and the present government that cheese sales could have been increased and the butter surplus reduced.

Dealing with the economic situation, Mr. Pennell mentioned that the gross national product was up but yet the situation is not good. There is

an estimated 600-700 million dollar budget deficit and a loss of 850 million dollars in Unemployment Insurance which has brought it to almost insolvency. A new government taking over must create 1 million new jobs in the next four years. To bring this about, the Liberals are urging extensive training and re-training programs for workers displaced by automation. Dealing with the government's promise to increase the salaries of armed services employees, Mr. Pennell stated that Mr. Diefenbaker's suggestion that the Liberals held up this legislation is open to skepticism due to the fact that it is the sole prerogative of the Government to increase salaries without consulting the opposition. Paul Martin pointed out that "Canada's greatest need is a strong majority government and that the delicate balance of Canada's domestic and international affairs cannot stand up to another House of Ministers. Hope for Canada's political future must be found in honest, intelligent men prepared to devote the best years of their life to public service in Parliament and having observed Larry Pennell in the House of Commons, I would respectfully urge that he be given the support of people of all political inclinations."
