WEST HALDIMAND GENERAL HOSPITAL SHOWS PROGRESS

There has been considerable progress at the West Hal-
dimand General Hospital site
over the past three weeks. The
building has now been closed in
and the interior work will ac-
cording to the tradesmen in the
weeks ahead. It is hoped that
the building will be ready for
completion by December 31st.
The previous scheduled com-
pletion date of December 31st
was delayed by the Electricians
strike which held up work for

several weeks. The grounds have recently
been leveled and seeded all of
which adds much to the general
appearance of the lay-out. It is
expected the access roads sur-
rounding the hospital will be
raised to grade within the next
few weeks and asphalt paving
will be completed in certain
areas.

Mr. C. C. Paylor, Administrator
of the Hospital, advises that
tenders for the balance of the
equipment will be going out
shortly and that he fully antici-
pates the Hospital will be ready
to go into operation within a
month after the completion of
the building.

Dr. R. G. Hyde, chairman of
the Finance Committee, stated
he is generally pleased with the
developments to date. He pointed
out, however, that the pro-
ject had been planned in the
expectation that all financial

pledges would be fulfilled. We
are still confident, he said, that
those who have pledged finan-
cial assistance to the Hospital
will meet their commitments.
If this does not occur, he con-
tinued, it will be a matter of
grave concern to the Hospital
Board.

There are presently some
pledges in arrears and the
Hospital Board is most anxious
to have these brought up to
date as early as possible.
