It strikes us as mighty peculiar that the Maple Leaf would join forces with the Toronto Globe and Mail to create hysteria over a matter of such importance.

When the conservative party is in power Sam would have you believe that Devil run the Legislature. Quite the contrary. And when he says the Jarvis Editor was upset he was getting pretty close to the truth. For a change, Ted Sir Sam, we were upset because we have a high regard for the abilities of Hon. Fred Cass who has given the benefits of his talents to the people of Ontario through Public Service. And it upsets us because of the interpretation put

on one act of this public servant by a Newspaper it will mean the end of a fine career in public service.

By a new regulation under the Highway Traffic Act, brakes must be efficient enough to bring a car or station wagon to a stop within 25 feet when it is travelling at 20 miles an hour. This is a very high standard for commercial vehicles there is a graduated scale according to the weight of the vehicle.

The former regulation specified a maximum stopping distance of 40 feet for all vehicles. Any vehicle should be able to meet the requirement with the brakes in good condition and its tires have a good tread," Mr. Hackett said.

The new regulation has been made in the interest of greater traffic safety, and it conforms with the Uniform Vehicle Code.

The stopping distance in the regulation is the distance from the time the driver's foot touches the brake pedal to the time the vehicle is stopped.

For other types of vehicles, there are the new requirements for maximum stopping distances:

Trucks with total weight of vehicle and load of five tons or less, 30 feet; more than five tons, 40 feet; combination of tractor and trailer, where the trailer has a registered gross weight of one and a half tons or less, 40 feet; combination of tractor and trailer where the trailer has a registered gross weight of more than one and a half tons, or combination of tractor and trailer where the trailer has a registered gross weight of more than one and a half tons, 50 feet. The maximum stopping distance for a motorcycle is 30 feet.
