BROCHURE HITS CO-OP ESCAPE FROM INCOME TAX

Toronto - The Equitable Income Tax Foundation has published a 64-page booklet protesting "unwarranted tax privilege" of Canadian co-operatives and credit unions. It warns that continuation of these privileges could make Canada a socialist state.

Urging the Federal Government to review and repeal these "privileges", the Foundation booklet argues that the income tax advantages of co-operatives are so great as to drive and "numerous other Governmental Bodies of Economy with recommendations that would achieve tax equality".

The publication contains photographs and illustrations depicting alleged "inequities" in the various provinces. One co-operative with annual net profits of \$780,000, the booklet notes, paid income taxes of only \$28,000 in 1963, or a rate of 3.7 per cent compared with a rate of 52 per cent paid by ordinary companies. The publication also claims that credit unions, with assets of \$1.8 billion, pay no income tax at all, while other financial institutions conducting similar business are taxed at 52 per cent of their profits.

Co-operatives are expanding and buying out tax-paying investor-owned competitors at "an ever-accelerating rate", the booklet claims.

"The publication explains that while tax imposed on shareholders or companies is applied prior to distribution of profits, the income taxes paid by co-operative corporations are computed after they have distributed their (post-tax) dividends to patron-owners. And new co-operatives were income tax-free for three years.

The co-operative therefore could retain the major portion of its earnings as tax-free capital for expansion, the publication writes. "The privileged income tax status of co-operatives and
