You might as well begin now, making a congenial job of your living with the local people. One of the best signs of a wholesome neighborhood here is that many of the local people can speak comfortably of lifetime friendships, both among their relatives and others. This is the justification of the years that has in it much of God's own wisdom.

I like that discovery about this community very much. It is like the old-time motto of the Burning Bush (New Testament), Burning, yet not consumed. An unknown writer has given us a thought for the days ahead that might have within them the seeds of living in a place as though you were going to be there a hundred years.

The night was dark, the shadows spread in the dark. I stretched my hand to a human Christ, and I walked through the dark with me.

Out of the darkness we came at length.

Our feet on the deep, warm sod.

And I knew by the light of His wondrous face, that I walked with the Son of God."

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

SAUSAGE PEACHERINO
Serves 5 Easy and Economical

1 1/2 lbs. sausage meat
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups soft bread crumbs
1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
dash of pepper
1 egg, beaten
10 canned Canadian frozen peas
whole cloves
1/2 cup peach syrup

Combine sausage, onion, bread crumbs, egg and seasonings. Form into ten balls. Bake in shallow pan in moderate oven (350° F.), 25 minutes. Remove from oven. Drain off fat. Drain peach halves and stud with 4-6 cloves. Place a sausage ball on top of each peach half. Add syrup and return to oven for 20 minutes, basting with syrup.
