INCENTIVES WITH RETENTIVES

We have always said, and most people will agree with us, "that tax incentives are a necessity if the good periods of to-day are to grow and remain with us for any length of time."

However when the government does get around to incentives it usually does so in a manner that is more retentive than incentive. A small business can get expansion grants but they are not grants in the true sense of the word. They are loans, made after the small business has paid its taxes due. Loans that are made to the small business, true over an extended period, but interest bearing near the less. It is simply a form of lending back to the small business, monies already collected from the same outfit and charging
