

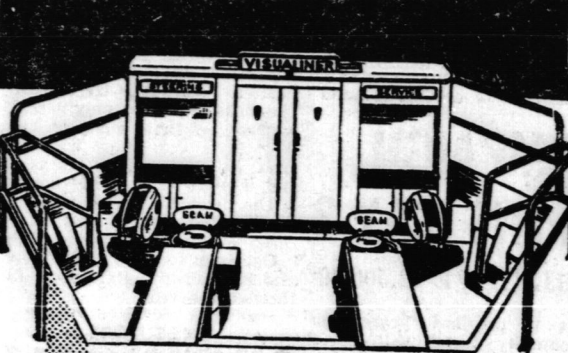

## ONTARIO SOCIETY FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

The Semi Annual Meeting of the Ontario Society for Crippled Children and its affiliated service clubs in the counties of Lincoln, Welland and Halton was held in Cayuga on Thursday, April 22nd.

At this meeting, representatives from the Easter Seal service clubs met with nurses and officials of the society to discuss the program of activities being carried on for the benefit of crippled children. A special feature of the meeting was a demonstration by the Society nurse on the function of a Mistogen Tent which is part of the equipment used in the treatment of children who have cystic fibrosis. The services of the Ontario Society for Crippled Children include: assistance to treatment centres; research — all made possible through the funds raised by the Service Club's Annual Easter Seal Campaign.

Chairman of the District Meeting was Mr. B. Lindesay of the Lions Club of Port Colborne. The service clubs represented were: Caledonia Men's Club, Cayuga Rotary, Dunville Lions, Fisherville Lions, Fort Erie Rotary, Hagersville Lions, Jarvis Lions, Niagara Falls Rotary, Port Colborne Lions, St. Catharines Rotary, Welland Rotary.

The following members of the Jarvis Lions Club attended the meeting: Ed Stire, Chairman; Easter Seals; Jo Montague, Treasurer; Easter Seals.
