RECIPE OF THE MONTH

By the Ontario Tender Fruit Institute
 "Buy Canada Choice Canned Fruit"

PLUM ROLY POLY
 Serves 8 For a Snack or Dessert
 3 cups biscuit mix 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 2 tablespoons melted butter 1/2 cup canned strained plums (or junior plums)
 1/2 cup sugar
 Prepare your own biscuit dough or use a prepared mix. Roll out in 18x10-inch rectangle. Spread with melted butter. Combine sugar and spices. Sprinkle 1/2 on biscuit mix. Spread with strained plums leaving a 1-inch margin. Sprinkle with remaining sugar and spices. Roll up and cut in 1-inch slices. Place slices, cut side up, in a greased pan or muffin tin. Bake in hot oven (400°F.) 15-18 minutes.

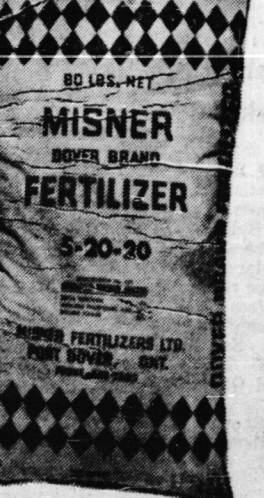
