NEW HIGHWAY SAFETY TRIANGLE

A new type of highway safety warning device is beginning to appear on Canadian highways, announced the Canadian Highway Safety Council.

This new safety red triangle is clearly visible day and night, at a distance of 1,500 feet. When a vehicle, for any reason, is stalled on the side of a highway, the safety device is placed 100 feet behind the stalled car or truck.

Constructed of aluminum, surfaced with red reflective material, it is always visible, day or night, in any weather condition, and there is no need for power.
