SAUSAGE PEACHERINO

SERVES 5 EASY AND ECONOMICAL

- 1 lb. sausage meat
- 1 egg, beaten
- 11 tablespoons minced onion
- 2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- dash of pepper
- 20 canned Canadian tree-ripe peach halves, drained
- whole cloves
- 1/2 cup peach syrup

Combine sausage, onion, bread crumbs, egg and seasonings. Form into ten balls. Bake in shallow pan in moderate oven (350°F.) 25 minutes. Remove from oven. Drain off fat. Drain peach halves and stud with 4 whole cloves. Place a sausage ball on top of each peach half. Add syrup and return to oven for 20 minutes, basting with syrup.

A WOMAN'S WAY

The tiny house stood on top of the hill looking almost deserted. Neighbours in the valley had seen little of the occupants since they'd arrived from Europe some weeks ago. A stockily built man left the house each morning, was seen striding down the hill to work, but none knew where he was employed; and the three small children were kept in the garden. Gently, but with determination, she finally got the story from her husband. A malignant tumor had been removed, and she supposed she was cured. Now she didn't know if one of us doesn't make a move, the poor things will never get to know anyone.

So it was that the young immigrant mother found herself making a pot of tea one morning for two of her neighbours, wives of small farmers in the valley. She spoke some English, but did not feel like communicating much more than her pleasure at having visitors.

What should she do? Tell them how worried she was about the abdominal pain that had persisted since leaving Europe? She had not even told her husband; he had enough to worry him in a new country, with a new job that wasn't paying very well as yet. She let the neighbours go with a warm smile and thanks, and sat down in the lonely kitchen again, wondering only what she could do to relieve the pain.

The one thing she wanted to avoid was telling her husband, or giving trouble to anyone in this new country. For how was she to pay for a doctor? Where would they take her? No, she would endure the pain.

SECONDARY ENROLLMENT WILL BE DOUBLED IN FEW YEARS

In his report at the nomination meeting on Monday night, Mr. E. J. Jarvis, representative on the West Haldimand High School Board, pointed out that there are presently 3,117 elementary students attending public schools in the West Haldimand area between the ages of 6-13. He also pointed out that the capacity of the present secondary schools is 1,570.

Based on these figures the Board is proceeding with plans for a new secondary school at Hagersville. The operating budget of the secondary schools in 1964 was \$74,000. This money is raised by Government Grants of 40% municipal taxes 44% and the balance is made up from tuition fees and sundry revenue.

Teacher's salaries account for 62 percent of the disbursements; Transportation 10%; in the Ontario Cancer Treatment and Research Foundation Clinic in London of seven (7) in Ontario taking treatment. Here other Cancer Society volunteers talked to her, escorted her to treatment, and gave her coffee, tea, and food.

Since it was quite a distance to the Clinic, a volunteer driver of the Society drove her back and forth, and another volunteer arranged for a neighbour, whose children were grown up, to care for her little ones, and cook the meals while treatments were in progress.

On the drives back and forth time she grew far less apprehensive and depressed, she learned that in 1963, 2,968 patients were transported to clinics from outside the treatment area. There were 24, 513 trips made altogether; she was told, "encompassing 512, 431 miles of driving."

With this kind of information, she felt less alone in her illness and forgot her feeling of being beholden to charity for the help she was receiving. The male driver met her, and was able to get him a more suitable and better job. The young mother is still going to the Clinic for check-ups, but full confidence in the Canadian doctors and the treatment she received, and knows that she is not alone, in pain or consternation, again.
