ONTARIO PLOWMAN NAMED CANADIAN CHAMPION

Ontario beef farmer, 38 in Canada, representing eight provinces competed in good weather for several days before the competition, the weather man relented and plowing conditions in the fields were good. The contestants plowed in stubble land on Wednesday, October 13, and in soil on the 14th.
