WILLIAM H. HOBBS WINS MARKSMEN SHIELD
 William H. Hobbs of R.R. 1 Jarvis, Ont., has qualified for the Silver Expert Shield, one of the most difficult tests in handgun shooting. * * *

Dominion Marksmen officials announced last week the 25-year-old businessman had achieved a score of 5,900 points out of 6,000 to qualify. * * *

For the Silver Expert Shield (Handgun) the shooter must fire 20 sets of three targets, each set consisting of one slow one timed and one rapid fire target, and each set scoring 265 out of 300 or better. * * *

Mr. Hobbs, a member of the ONWA Handgun and Rifle Club, has been shooting for three years. * * *

Before winning the silver shield he had to work his way through a series of approximately 100 over a year.
