"There are numerous examples where newspapers have taken a project—an industrial development program, a new educational facility or a similar project—and whipped up enthusiasm so that the community has generated an entirely new aggressive attitude.  
"Even more numerous are occasions where a newspaper has uncovered a serious problem within its community and has used its news and editorial columns to awaken the public conscience."  
Mr. McKenna said that no other medium has had similar success in building public enthusiasm.  
"People identify with their newspaper; they believe it," he said. "Other media are regarded as entertainers, rather than educators."

**HOW THE WINES OF CANADA WERE BORN**

When the Norse explorer, Leif Ericson, first came to this shore he referred to the grapes as "vinland" because of the production of grapes and wine. We know that the liquid in the Niagara region was produced in another way. But that's another story.  
The Canadian wine industry today many fine Canadian wines are as good as or better than the great majority of wines produced anywhere in the world. But that's another story.  
Several Indian tribes among them the Seneca and the Cayuga produced their own wine from these wild grapes and their annual rite, The Wisachigim, to propitiate the water gods who lived under Niagara Falls.  
To the early French settlers who came to this country the honour of having made the first palatable wine (as we know it) from Canadian grapes is recorded in Le Jeune's journal. He noted that in 1635, these Frenchmen, isolated from their homeland, dreamed of the wine they knew of the country we now know as Ontario. The first evidence of commercial grape cultivation in Canada is in 1811 when an ex-patriate German corporal, John Schuller, built and operated a winery at Cooksville near Toronto. Here the first few gallons of Canadian wine were produced, sold and shipped to neighbouring hamlets. John Schuller can thus be rightly acknowledged father of the Canadian wine industry.  
Beginning about 1850 articles on wine-making appeared in government papers and some agricultural publications. In 1860 John Kilborn reported on a single vine during one season which produced 1000 lbs. of wine. During this formative period several vineyards were established. Some of the best Wines, Barnes Wines and Jordan's are still famous. The amazing growth of the industry in the past several years can best be measured by studying the largest wine cellars in the country established in 1874. Originally some 10,000 square feet and had provision for the aging of 50,000 gallons of wine. These cellars still form part of the modern winery that houses, in addition, a vast complex of wine cellars, more than 2,000,000 gallons of maturing wine. **This Week**

Hundreds of angry farmers stormed through the Ontario legislature this week to demand higher government subsidies for their produce.  
Leaders of the demonstration sponsoring Ontario Farmers' Federation met with Premier John Roberts and Agriculture Minister William Stewart, and said they would continue to demand the federal government raise its price supports for farmers' wares, especially milk.  
Some of the farmers there, whose ark had driven there, by slow moving tractor, from 100 miles as distant as 200 miles. A three-pronged protest to Toronto from Woodstock had been underway since the O.P.U. Monday, about 600 tractors delayed traffic on the provincial highway. The numbers turned out for the protest on subsequent days. The Ontario Provincial Police closely supervised the demonstrations and ordered the farmers to the side of the road whenever a large number of vehicles were lined up behind the tractors.  
Wednesday, O.P.U. President John Dolner called a halt to the tractor demonstrations pending a meeting in Ottawa with federal Agriculture Minister J. J. Green.  
In Toronto, the O.P.U. demanded tariff protection to prevent imports undercutting Ontario prices on some produce. They said low-priced imports of lettuce from the United States are being dumped on the Canadian market, making it unprofitable for the Ontario farmer to offer his lettuce for sale.  
The O.P.U., a rival of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, was formed as a protest against the government's long-standing offer of the government-owned O.P.A. in 1902. The current government's position is that the Ontario farmer's demands for higher income for his produce are being met. Several weeks after the Queen's Park meeting, Mr. Dolner told his group that progress had been made and the demonstrations had proved their usefulness.  
The only concession won by the government, however, was Mr. Dolner's pledge to participate in the farmers' protest with federal Agriculture Minister J. J. Green. The O.P.U. said that it would not be held responsible for any violence that might occur. Mr. Dolner said that control over milk prices is a provincial concern. The farmers' protest has been in part a result of concern over drought conditions wide-

**SCHOOL BUS LAW ACT AMENDED**

Hon. Irwin Hackett, Minister of Transport, introduced in the Legislature the following amendments to the Highway Traffic Act which have been enacted at the session just concluded.  
Starting September 1st, motorists will be required to stop when overtaking and when approaching a school bus stopped with signals flashing.  
Where a school bus is stopped on a highway on which the maximum speed limit is greater than 35 miles per hour for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children, the driver of a vehicle when overtaking a school bus must stop before reaching the school bus and shall not proceed until the school bus resumes motion or the signal lights are illuminated by intermittent flashes, shall stop the vehicle before reaching the school bus and shall not proceed until the school bus resumes motion or the signal lights are no longer operating.  
Likewise when meeting on such a highway other than a highway with separate roadways, a school bus on which two red signal lights are illuminated with intermittent flashes, motorists must stop before reaching the school bus and proceed only when the signal lights are not operating.
