WEST HALDIMAND GENERAL HOSPITAL FROM BIRTH TO ACCREDITATION
 — By C. C. PAYLOR, Administrator —

ON FEBRUARY 1966, the West Haldimand General Hospital was in the final stages of its building program and the building contractors were making strenuous efforts to achieve completion for the opening day of March 1st. The hospital telephone lines were extremely busy in a coordinated attempt to tie together the many people who were concentrated there. Within the hospital were concentrated some 1,000 people including plumbers, electricians, mechanical engineers, painters, floor finishers, carpenters, masons, and all the other tradesmen connected with a major building contractor. Among them also were the embryonic hospital staff, which was soon to be a coordinated organization capable of carrying on the sick.

On August 16th, 1965, only seventeen months after the hospital was surveyed by Dr. Genesee of the Canadian Council on Hospital Accreditation and thereafter received the welcome news that provisional accreditation had been granted. On October 20th, 1965, the hospital was again surveyed and received the accreditation certificate.

The seventeen months between birth and accreditation were the most challenging and interesting months I have spent in the hospital field. The opportunity of taking a part in the planning, construction and organizing of an entirely new hospital was an occurrence and although the assignment is a tremendously difficult one, it presents an opportunity to receive enormous amounts of personal satisfaction.

From the very beginning, two years prior to the actual opening when all we had were plans, ideas and a deserted shop covered field, in every decision I was made, whether by the Board, or the Medical Staff, we considered the effect upon the care and comfort of the patient in the hospital. This atmosphere prevailed throughout many long meetings and it became the clinching point when a particularly difficult decision had to be made.

As the hospital took form and became the building we know, we looked forward to the time when it was occupied by patients so that our stand which we were then formulating could be put to practice.

As opening day drew nearer our attempts at a suitable staff to the hospital were intensified. We were extremely fortunate in obtaining quite a number of replies from professional people interested in working in our new hospital and consequently great care to select applicants who were not qualified professionally, but also had that extra "se quos", which is most receptive to our programme for good patient care.

Following the engagement of department heads, the many meetings of this group. Throughout the process, there was instilled into every member of the staff, "It is good for beginning and stop higher", "We must place the patient before our aspirations and above everything else." Once this feeling became dominant at meetings permeated throughout the hospital as many more employees were engaged.

Our opening day came on March 1st, 1966, the patients arrived and the first acid test of the accreditation commenced. The procedures formulated by all of the committees strengthened them.

When the hospital organization had settled down through a smooth running unit we formed our Joint Committee composed of one elected member from each department plus two elected members from this committee and met with the Administrator to discuss ways and means of maintaining harmonious relationships among staff below the professional level. It was also a means of disseminating Board policy into the lower paid employees, and enabling them to participate with top management in the operation of the hospital. This committee became actively interested in the quality of patient care and provided a variety of excellent suggestions.

On July 1965, I suggested at meetings of the Medical Staff, Department Heads and Joint Executive committees that the demonstrated quality of patient care already being practised was so high, that with their recommendations, an announcement was received with enthusiasm by the Board and by everyone concerned. We were granted a survey on August 1965. Every one was so enthusiastic that all we had to do was announce the date of the survey knowing that the part in showing the surveyor we were
