JARVIS RED CROSS SOCIETY RE-ELECT OFFICERS

Mrs. A. S. Blight was hostess for the Annual Meeting of the Jarvis Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society on Wednesday, January 26, 1966.

The President's report showed that a total of \$10,000.00 had been sent to South Vietnam during the past year, as well as 31 cases of clothing valued at \$107.49 from the Canadian Red Cross which she had expressed willingness to help in the Vietnam should the need arise.

Following the cyclone disaster in East Pakistan the Federal Government had sent \$10,000.00. The Canadian Red Cross had donated \$5,000.00 along with 132 cartons of supplies valued at \$33,486.

Jarvis Branch forwarded \$300 to the National Office in 1965 and spent \$44.87 locally, as well as supplying needed clothing, furnishings, and food to fire sufferers.

The sum of \$200.00 was voted to National Red Cross from funds on hand as of Jan. 1966. The point was stressed that should local disaster strike the Jarvis Branch could phone Zone Headquarters and receive help within a matter of hours.

ON THE FARM FRONT

Brief Notes For The Busy Farmer

Despite the extreme winter weather that we have been having recently we should be thinking ahead to the spring and seeding time. The importance of choosing the right seed and the best quality of seed cannot be overemphasized.

Forage crops occupy by far the largest percentage of crop acreage in Haldimand County. This is to be expected since Haldimand clay soils are best suited to forage crop production. It then follows that the selection of the seed mixture to be used should be a matter of great thought on the part of the farmer.

LADINO CLOVER MIXTURE—ES performs best as pasture, particularly in areas where moisture is plentiful and winter-killing is not a problem. They are difficult to cure and they make excellent silage. Orchardgrass performs well in combination with ladino, making an early maturing mixture. Ladino pasture presents a block hazard unless it is combined with grasses that are productive at the same time (during mid-summer).

RED CLOVER BASE MIXTURES are less popular today than in previous years because they produce for only short terms. For stored feed, red clover is not a good choice. Year and sometimes slightly the second harvest year.
