REMINDER TO MOTORISTS

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE ONTARIO HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ACT

STOP BOTH WAYS FOR SCHOOL BUSES

When a school bus is stopped and its red lights are flashing a motorist approaching the school bus from the front or overtaking it from the rear, must stop and remain stopped until the red signal lights on the bus are no longer flashing. EFFECTIVE NOW.

CLEAR VIEW

The windshield and the windows on either side of the front seat must afford a clear view of the roadway which does not afford a clear view of the roadway and vehicles behind, and there is an outside rear-view mirror which does afford this clear view. EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 1, 1966.

UNNECESSARY NOISE

A person who drives a motor vehicle and causes it to make an unnecessary noise commits an offence. EFFECTIVE NOW.

INTERNATIONAL DRIVING PERMIT

Any non-resident of Ontario, who is the holder of an International Driving Permit, may operate a vehicle in Ontario. EFFECTIVE NOW.

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IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE ONTARIO HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ACT

SIGNAL LANE CHANGES

When changing lanes, you must signal such change. EFFECTIVE NOW.

COMMERCIAL VEHICLE LOADS

The gross weight of a trailer, other than a semi or pole trailer shall not exceed 32,000 pounds; and the weight on one axle shall not exceed 18,000 pounds; and if the axles are less than 8 feet apart, the weight shall not exceed 14,000 pounds. EFFECTIVE NOW.

All loads on trucks must be secured, covered or loaded in such a manner that no part of the load may become dislodged. EFFECTIVE NOW.

PEDESTRIANS

A pedestrian walking along a highway must walk facing the traffic and as close to the left hand edge of the road as possible. EFFECTIVE NOW.
