Under Wide Skies

So you want to get out of your little rut for a while? Spread your wings and have a swinging time. Where will you go—New York, San Francisco, New Orleans, Montreal? Lovely, except that those places are a long way off especially when you have a limited holiday. Did you consider Toronto, perhaps. I know what you are about to say. "You have to be kidding!" No, I really mean it. Toronto can no longer be reviled with the familiar epithets—Yonge Street or standing on the corners of King and Bay—as throngs of people eady about you and rush noisily past. Here is excitement, vitality, adventure, a whole new world—your world!

With Canada about to launch its new tax-paid pension plan, a review of our neighbor's long experience in this field could be both interesting and instructive. Since the U.S. started its Social Security program 30 years ago both benefits and contributions have risen sharply, but the pension tax has climbed a good deal faster than the benefit under Social Security. Also of interest is the point that even after 30 years the maximum benefit under Social Security is not much higher than the maximum Canada Pension Plan will pay. In fact, the U.S. work or pay for three times the pension tax that Canada workers will pay to start.

With the swollen aim of keeping the pension out of politics, the original Social Security law provided (as does the Canada Pension Act) a fixed schedule for future pension increases. Originally, the maximum cost to the taxpayer was \$30 a year, and the legislation provided that the cost would be \$85 monthly; now it is \$16 and it will rise to \$127 in 1966.

By way of comparison, the Canada Pension Plan's maximum on retirement at age 65 is 25 per cent of contributions plus \$104.17 a month. Benefits have increased, but not in proportion. To start, the maximum pension at age 65 was \$85 monthly; now it is \$16 and it will rise to \$127 in 1966.

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LEGAL AID IN HALDIMAND
At a general meeting of the Haldimand Law Association which was held at the Court House, Cayuga, on March 22, final plans for a Legal Aid Act were completed. While there is no "means" test for legal aid there is a "means" test for the Department of Public Welfare which pay require that the applicant be on the need of legal aid rather than on the means of the applicant.
