VILLAGE OF JARVIS

The Ratepayers of The Village of Jarvis, Haldimand County

We have examined the records of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis, the Hydro-Electric System, the Water and Sewerage System, the Public School Board and the Centennial Centre Board for the year ended December 31, 1966 and prepared the following statements:

STATEMENT 1 - Revenue Fund & Capital Fund Balance Sheet

STATEMENT 2 - Statement of Revenue and Expenditure

The year's operations resulted in a deficit of \$30,000.00 over the opening surplus of \$30,000.00. The deficit for the year, together with the balance of surplus at the beginning of the year of \$1,316.92, result in an accumulated surplus at December 31, 1966 of \$7,136.92.

TAXES IN ARREARS at December 31, 1966 amount to \$2,726.76, an increase of \$301.80 from the same time last year. We have not reflected on the statement of revenue and expenditure the amount of taxes in arrears at the end of the year. The construction of a sewage and waterworks system was almost completed in 1966. Financing consists of the following:

Fee increases announced recently by the Ontario Medical Association are not likely to have more than a fractional effect on automobile insurance costs, according to J. B. Hummel, Ontario manager of All Canada Insurance Federation.

"Most insurance payments, about two-thirds, are used for replacement or repair of automobiles," said Mr. Hummel. "The remaining third, which goes for personal injuries, is split between medical bills, hospital bills, compensation for time lost from work and compensation for pain and suffering."

"Although it is not generally known, automobile insurance pays hospital bills when an insured motorist is at fault," said Mr. Hummel. "The Ontario Hospital Insurance system only pays on behalf of an accident victim when automobile insurance does not cover the bill."

"The medical bill may run to several hundred dollars but the cost of firing the cars involved could well be into the thousands," he said.
