The ire of many Canadians was aroused last week with the words spoken by President Charles De Gaulle of France. The words "Vive le Quebec Libre" was the fuse that lit the tinder of Quebec nationalism which triggered Prime Minister Pearson's rebuke of President De Gaulle.

As a guest of this country, De Gaulle had no right to express his opinions of the internal problems related to the Province of Quebec and the remainder of Canada, in a public statement. Prime Minister

Persons had no choice but to publicly rebuke De Gaulle's statement and he did so in a manner befitting a man with many years of diplomatic experience. He simply stated that "The people of Canada are free. Every province of Canada is free. Canadians do not need to be liberated." It was said that President De Gaulle's visit had to end on such a note for he is a man that leads a great nation and that has made great strides under his leadership. Although his words created a sudden burst of defiance from nearly all Canadians, in the long run it may tend to draw us closer together in that we do not want any outsider to take sides in our internal struggles. A married man will know and has undoubtedly had the experience of repeating something said by his wife about her mother only to have the wife jump on her husband for saying it. In effect we can say that we desire but not want someone else say the same thing and it has a tendency to draw us closer together.

The desire for a free Quebec is sponsored by a minority group. Their cause has been set back because of the recent fuss started by De Gaulle. Many persons who in the past have sat on the fence have taken their side and are now openly opposed to a free Quebec. For instance Mayor Jean Drapeau of Montreal, in the presence of De Gaulle, stated that "We are not here to make short-term gains, but to export our culture and serve Canada better. We are attached to this immense country." It cannot be said that Jean Drapeau is a separatist but the weight of his speech and his opinions undoubtedly will sway many people away from the separatist cause.

A free Quebec could only hurt Canada and Quebec would suffer economic hardships and Canada would suffer from the lack of culture which presently flows from Quebec. The Province of Quebec is part of our history and the traditions that have grown from her association with the rest of Canada as a modern nation.

Let us hope that the turmoil created by President Charles De Gaulle's remarks will draw

An Old Age Security application form may be obtained at your local Post Office, or by writing to the Regional Director of Old Age Security in the capital city of your province. With it you will receive a pamphlet giving full information about Old Age Security.

GUARANTEED INCOME SUPPLEMENT

As soon as your Old Age Security pension is approved, you will be sent information about the Guaranteed Income Supplement application form. You may be entitled to a supplement which, together with your Old Age Security pension, will guarantee you a monthly income of at least \$105.00.
