The park facilities developed by the local Lions Club has been used specifically for the game of basketball and for little else in the way of recreation for the young people of the community. It would appear that many other uses could be made of the grounds and the buildings that are available in the park. For instance, it is conceivable that the Community Hall could be used for the game of basketball or volleyball during the winter months. Many villages of the size of Jarvis do have Recreation Directors during the summer months to lead the younger generation in the pursuit of more sportsmanlike conduct.

It is obvious that this type of direction requires strong leadership and the services of

many people, to make such a program worthwhile. The advantages are many but most important it develops the minds of the younger people to take a more active interest in their own community which in turn makes them better citizens. As parents it is a responsibility to provide leadership and the facilities to aid in this development. As has been indicated by Mr. Shawbridge the Provincial Government is aware of this need and provides grants for the implementation of recreation facilities. It grants are available there is no doubt that the Government must also be willing to provide suggestions and offer direction in the development of a sound recreational program. It would be encouraging to know if someone is the growth of such a program. 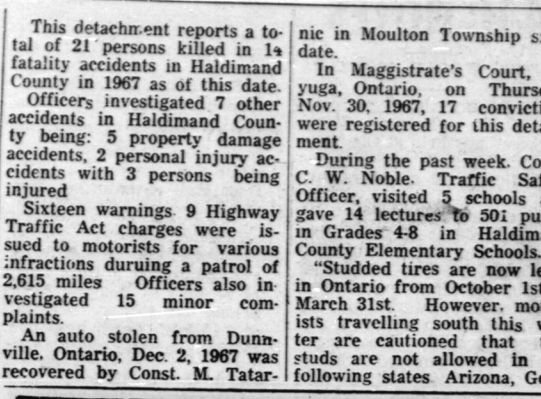
