LET'S HOPE WE ARE DRAWING CLOSER TO BETTER THINGS -

FOR THE LAST YEAR and a half the citizens of Jarvis have had to bear a burden. It has been a burden in the interests of progress. The basic foundation has now been laid. The superstructure must now get underway.

The first part of that superstructure is the restoration of our streets. This is a major problem. First and of the foremost necessity, is the restoration of the main thoroughfares known as No. 3 and No. 6 Highways. These two sections, by resolution of Council at their last meeting, have been turned back to The Ontario Department of Highways. The Department of Highways, recognizing the necessity of restoring these sections at an early date, has assumed, from the Village, the Engineering Plans drawn up by the consulting firm, engaged by the Village, for the restoration of these thoroughfares. The contract of the consulting firm has been terminated and the plans will be exercised by The Department of Highways from this point on.

While there remains certain technical and Governmental factors to be resolved, it is not entirely optimistic to expect an early start on the restoration of the two main roadway arteries through the Village. Provided the Department of Highways adopt, completely, the planning for this restoration as drawn by the consulting engineers, we can expect, within one year, a whole new face in the core of our municipality.

Let us ever be cognizant, however, that the undertaking of installing Water and Sewage has placed a most unusual strain upon our economic position. There will be increases in taxes, perhaps in the capacity to meet it if we feel a true sense of responsibility to community life.

True. No one likes to pay taxes; many do not want to pay anything to add to the welfare of the majority. But, in this Centennial year of our nation, the citizens of Jarvis should dedicate themselves to the proposition we have a heritage to preserve and because of lack of foresight in the past, the present generation of taxpayers must bear the greater burden. Let us not assume the role of martyrs in this situation, but rise to meet it and with courage. It can and must be accomplished.

The greatest prospect of relief, economically, from this situation is an improvement in our residential assessment. We can always, of course, be hopeful of industrial prospects. Such hopes, however, are diminishing and we should be mindful of that. We think our best bet, at the moment, is to try and develop our community as a pleasant place to live, to provide housing that will appeal to the coming citizen whether to Hamilton, Oakville, or to the new Hydro generating plant at Nanticoke. There are so many opportunities open to us, as a community of citizens, we can see them.

Just remember, better days are ahead, and we can contribute to that goal more effectively by being constructive and optimistic than we can by being ready to level criticism at every opportunity.
