LAND CONTROL

Housing lots 70 feet wide and more than 6,500 feet long show the failure of the "10-acre rule" to control land use.

The example was used by William McAdam of the Central Ontario Planning Board to show that restrictions on the size of farms don't age. the size of farms don't ade

divided them into lots 70 feet wide, each with 10 acres. This, he said, shows that acreage controls don't work.

He said spossible only with changes in the Pianning Act. Zoning laws control the use of land.

Mr. McAdam also charged that the high prices paid by city dwellers for 10-acre lots, using the minimum lot size to—for instance—25 acres would only increase the amount of land bought for speculation.

Another member of the panel. Don Deacon, said he is opposed to "nationalization"—purchase of land by the government to hold it in agriculture.

The provincial Liberal member for York Centre Mr. Deacon, said in answer to a question, it isn't necessary to save land especially for agriculture. There's no shortage of agricultural land in this country," he said.

Mr. Deacon rejected the suggestion that it was reasonable.

Mr. Deacon rejected the suggestion that it was reasonable to restrict the uses for which a man could sell his land.

Also on the panel were two farmers, Douglas Kemp of Bow manville and Cleason Snyder of Waterloo.

Mr. Kemp said it is urgently necessary to hold good farming

Mr. Kemp said it is urgently necessary to hold good farming land for agriculture. He said approval by the board of adjustment of the Department on Municipal Affairs should be necessary for all separations of less than 50 acres.

Mr. Snyder said a deterrent is needed to stop people building on good rural land. But he said subdivision control regulations as they stand now are not doing the job. They "are no solution, they're not helping anyone", he said.

Applause greeted a question from the floor about when legislation would be brought in "with teeth enough to hold land in agriculture?"




