tion.
An action against Ontario
Hydro would follow two charges
of violating the Metropolitan
Toronto air pollution by-law
against the steam plant.
The Metro Air Pollution Con-
trol division has also opposed
construction of a high-rise
tower near the plant claim-
ing that gases from the plant
would make the tower uninhab-
itable.
His sulphur dioxide counts
are so high that anyone who
knows anything about contam-
ination levels would have to
say no to further development
in that area, Mr. Donohue
said.
Metro officials have been us-
ing modifications to the Rich-
ard Hearn plant and the city
plant to control smoke and sul-
phur dioxide in the downtown
area.
Health experts recommend
that no more than 0.07 parts
of sulphur dioxide per 1,000,000
parts of air be permitted. Tot-
on's count is often as high as
1 part per 1,000,000.
Sulphur dioxide mixes with
water in the atmosphere to form
minute quantities of harm-
ful sulphuric acid which is har-
mful to the lungs.

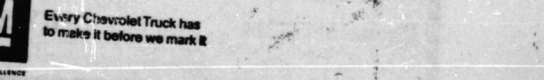
