ST. CATHARINES FIRM GETS
\$2 MILLION HYDRO CONTRACT

It was announced that Foster Wheeler Limited of St. Catharines has been awarded a contract worth more than \$2-million to supply 44 feed-water heater units for the under construction by Ontario Hydro at Nanticoke.

The Coal-fired plant, on the shore of Lake Erie, is scheduled to be producing two million kilowatts of energy from four generating units by 1974. The

heaters will form part of a closed-circuit water cycle, in which water is reused several times. According to Foster Wheeler, the contract is one of the largest placed for such equipment in Canada.

We have examined the records of the Township of Walpole, the Public School Area Board, the Roman Catholic Separate School Walpole-Hagersville, the Recreation Commission, the Community Halls and the Centennial Project for the year ended December 31, 1967 and have prepared statements as set forth in the accompanying index.

The operations of the year resulted in a surplus of \$21,342.23 which with the balance at the beginning of the year results in an accumulated surplus at December 31, 1967 of \$63,658.65.

Taxes in arrears have increased by \$9,822.22 at December 31, 1967 and amount to \$97,853.38 at that date. Collections during 1967 on the current roll amounted to \$81.8% of the taxes levied.

Subject to the qualifications concerning funds levied under Section 53 and subject bond coverage, we report that in our opinion:

(1) The financial transactions which have come under our notice have been within the powers of the municipality.

(2) The audit has been conducted in accordance with the standards of the Department of Municipal Affairs.

(3) The financial statements present fairly the financial position of the municipality as at December 31, 1967 and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date.
