The twenty-nine man membership Board of the Jarvis Public School Board advanced another step forward on Tuesday night when they appointed Bruce King as Treasurer and Business Administrator. Mr. King was one of twenty-three applicants for the position. The new administrator is a former Warden of the County of Haldimand, Clerk-Treasurer of the Township of Dunn and was a Squadron Leader in the R.C.A.F. in the last Great War. He has served as Interim Secretary - Treasurer of the Board since January 1, 1968.

Construction is now in progress at North Walpole and a new school has just been opened in Caledonia. Crowded conditions exist in Cayuga, Canboro and Moulton Townships. In his long range plan Mr. Fransen proposed a senior school in the Dunnville area and closing of several smaller schools in the Sherbrooke area and possible expansion of schools in Caledonia, Hagersville and Rainham Township.

During the current year a number of building programs will be completed. These include additions of two classrooms and kindergarten in North Walpole, kindergarten in Rainham Central, two classrooms and a general purpose room at Canboro Central and Science Unit. Three portable classrooms will also be needed for Moulton Cayuga and Rainham.

A resolution was passed by the Board to introduce two Kindergarten classes at North Walpole and one at J. L. Milner for the term beginning September 1968. Additional Kindergarten classes will also be added to Caledonia, Jarvis and Fairview schools. The present enrolment of Kindergarten in Caledonia is 210 children.
