**FORMER WALPOLE REEVE IS NEW MANAGER OF GRANDVIEW LODGE**  
 It was recently announced by the Administration Committee of the Halimand County Council that Edward H. Montague, former Reeve of Walpole Township, has been appointed Manager of Grandview Lodge at Dunville. His appointment is effective from April 1st, 1968.  
 Mr. Montague was selected for the position from about twenty applicants to succeed Wilfred Binns who is retiring due to ill health.
