 The following are the qualifications required to obtain the bursary offered by the West Haldimand General Hospital:
 1. Applicant must be a Canadian citizen.
 2. Applicant must be a resident of the West Haldimand County.
 3. Applicant must be a graduate of Grade 12 or 13.
 4. Applicant must be a member of the Nursing Association of Ontario.
 5. Applicant must be recommended by school principal.
 6. Applicant must be recommended by the following are the conditions of the bursary:
 a. The applicant is unable to complete the contract, payment of instalments received must be made within 30 days.
 b. The applicant receiving bursary shall agree to write articles for the hospital or for the nursing staff of West Haldimand General Hospital for a period of one year at the current salary. If said employment does not begin following graduation because of a post graduation course it shall begin at the end of the course.
 c. The amount of the bursary will be \$550.00 payable in instalments of \$50.00 in year 1, and \$250.00 in year two.

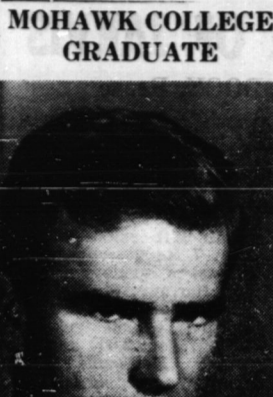
His educational address clearly indicated his knowledge of his subject. He portrayed the change in Agriculture in the past decade and whatever we can expect in the future.
