We assume that our present council is taking the necessary steps to see that the current tax base is increased so that the village can afford any expansion necessary to maintain its position as a location for new residents and industry.

TWO COUNTY PLAN BLOCKED BY HALDIMAND

A 15-man permanent planning committee has been set up in Haldimand County to study the county's needs and to establish liaison with Norfolk.

Immediate hopes of a joint Norfolk-Haldimand planning board were dashed by county council's announcement last week that the committee would be set up.

The committee will work with local planning boards as an educational and advisory body and its work should parallel that of the Norfolk educational committee on planning. Members will represent 15 Haldimand municipalities and will include Warden William Oster, Coun. Mrs. Lorna Miller and Karl Benner, clerk-treasurer.

Mr. Oster said at the Nov. 6 council meeting the new committee could become known as a planning board if it does its job well and the committee members could represent Haldimand if a two-county planning system is ever put into effect.

ADMINISTRATION

The Administrator of a hospital whether it be large or small, occupies a very challenging position. His first responsibility is to ensure that all the activities within the hospital operate in such a way that they are directed as closely and efficiently as possible to the care and welfare of the patients. As the chief executive officer he must act as a liaison between groups under his control and groups not under his control and correlate their activities.

Many average sized hospitals employ people of as many as 50 separate professions and trades in their routine work, and to make this even more complex a seven day week and twenty-four hour day is required to supply the necessary type of service to the patients.

In this 24 hour day service amidst the multitude of technologies, the administrator must plan, direct and control the activities of both highly trained specialized personnel and those provided with the job training. The overall level of hospital care depends to a great deal on both the quality of medical care and the effectiveness of administration, and it is the administrator's duty to ensure that the organization is able to result the administrator must continually seek ways and means of bringing about desirable changes to improve the elements which contribute to good hospital service.
