DUNNVILLE SCHOOL OPENED

Mr. Wm. Davis, Minister of Education, opened the addition to the High School at Dunnville, the evening of Friday, October 4th.

He was introduced by the Hon. Mr. Allan and at the beginning of his speech Mr. Davis paid tribute to Mr. Allan for his contribution to his province to education and to his community.

The preliminaries over, Mr. Davis reminded his audience that the 1969 Board of Education would have fewer members and more work and that the public should not take their efforts for granted.

Mr. Davis considered that students are at an interesting and difficult period of their lives, a period when great social changes are taking place. He said a larger proportion of young people are now in a secondary education and that their aims and ambitions are different to what they were ten or fifteen years ago.

According to the Canadian Economic Council, tax dollars invested in education can be expected to yield a return of 14 to 18 per cent. He stressed that the Province can no longer depend on its natural resources for its wealth. To compete in the industrial world, education for all its people, both young and adult.

He felt the education system could be improved by having larger units of administration, by a more diversified program in the schools and by more frequent contact between academic and technical courses. In administration, he should not be ruled out. Changes were being made in curriculum and the Province would have some experimental ungraded classes this year.

We need to provide better experience and faster progress for our students.

He mentioned in passing that the adults, especially the parents, have responsibilities too. Children learn by example and parents should look at their own behavior and not tell their children's mistakes on the school.

He advised the Boards to invest wisely, make sure their money is being used effectively, be more creative, and use school facilities to the maximum for young and adults.

He admitted it was most difficult to predict and plan for the future. A child now in kindergarten would have available to him when he finished school 12 years as much new knowledge, developed in that 12 years as had been developed in the last hundred years.

In a few years it will be an altogether different world and it is important for the public to develop programmes for that world. The Province will try to keep pace.

The Ontario Safety League is impressed with the potential for reducing a night driving car crash hazard of a "tail safe" headlight, about to be introduced on the Canadian market. This Tung-Sol head lamp has an extra long-lasting safety filament that remains lit after a main filament burns out. It gives a low-candle-power warning glow to oncoming cars. Without such a device it is impossible to tell if a single light is backed by a second light. The danger of a "one-eyed" car is that other drivers cannot judge its position on the road, without knowing which light is out. Also, it is very difficult at night to estimate the speed of an oncoming or overtaking vehicle that has only one light. This Tung-Sol head lamp will cost about 35 cents more than a conventional sealed beam headlamp.
