## THE EDITOR'S COLUMN

It is difficult to conceive  
what developments might take  
place in our community over  
the next five or ten years and  
even more difficult still to  
know, with any degree of cer-  
tainty, what actual develop-  
ments will take place in the  
next year.

There is sound to be a tre-  
mendous industrial complex  
arising from the basic Hydro  
development and Steel Com-  
pany proposals. It is not sim-  
ply a matter of providing hous-  
ing for Hydro and Steel Com-  
pany personnel in the imme-  
diate community. It is a mat-  
ter of projecting our thinking  
over a period of at least ten  
years and trying to anticipate  
what might take place in that  
time. It is not a matter of  
any one municipality capturing  
the advantages that will arise  
from these developments but  
rather a matter of all municipa-  
lities in the area giving  
their best judgement to an over-  
all plan that will be accom-  
modate the needs arising from  
these possible developments.

Man is a cruel animal. While  
we have emerged somewhat  
from the philosophy of "sur-  
vival of the fittest" we surely  
must recognize that the prin-  
ciple still is an underlying fac-  
tor in the thinking of most in-  
dividuals. As long as that area  
persists and no other consid-  
eration is given the difficulties  
of developing our area properly  
and in the best interests of all  
for the future will present ma-  
jor road blocks. Our personal  
observation leads us to the be-  
lief that thinking must be  
changed. It is not a matter of  
those charged with these admin-  
istrative duties looking upon  
municipalities as separate  
question on the activities of  
those similarly charged with  
responsibilities in neighbour-  
ing municipalities. These  
groups simply must get to-  
gether and develop a trust and  
confidence in one another.

We quite appreciate that ag-  
ain the philosophy of "sur-  
vival of the fittest" con-  
tinue to put the smaller municipa-  
lities in a position of jeopardy.  
However, any larger municipa-  
lity for purposes of personal  
gain, that pursued their admin-  
istration in this direction would  
eventually find themselves in a  
position of disadvantage.

Jarvis would appear to be a  
likely core for the broad de-  
velopment of the future. It  
must be remembered, however,  
that Jarvis cannot serve this  
need alone. Other municipa-  
lities will, of necessity, be  
a part of it. The problem  
is how to bring these municipa-  
lities together to work for  
the common good.

We don't know the answer  
but we do know that there  
must be a broadening of views  
at the administrative municipal  
trust one with the other and a  
common goal set for the ulti-  
mate benefit of all.
