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**MYCOPLASMA A TROUBLE MAKER**

OTTAWA—A Japanese discovery is exciting research scientists around the world, including two virologists at the Canada Department of Agriculture's Cell Biology Research Institute here.

The discovery, reported late last year, is that a group of plant disease-causing organisms commonly referred to as yellow type "viruses" may not be caused by viruses at all. They cause serious crop losses in Canada and other parts of the world, but until the Japanese reported their discovery, scientists assumed they were dealing with viruses. Now they suspect they are dealing with diseases caused by "mycoplasma-like organisms".

Many long hours of planning and development have been given voluntarily to insure that crippled children will receive their needed care and treatment, but this will only be possible if sufficient Easter Seal Funds are raised.

If the returned pink envelope has been misplaced, a gift, in a plain envelope addressed to Easter Seal, c/o your local Easter Seal service club will be just as effective — and will be gratefully received.

A late gift is better than none at all.

**Editorial Comment**  
**Marketing Boards Fear GFO**

Many members of commodity boards have expressed their fear of the proposed General Farm Organization because it may take way some if not all of their autonomy.

The key to the new organization will be its founding convention if Ontario's 110,000 farmers vote in favor of a compulsory checkoff, to both finance and enable a GFO to come to power.

The board may lose some of their autonomy if they stand idly by and let the founding convention decide the constitution and regulations of the new organization without making sure they have a voice.

If the farming community realizes that 80 per cent of farm income comes from commodities that have marketing boards representing a certain group of farmers the low income problem might be solved.

Farmers must learn the only way they can succeed in a world that is passing them by because of the cost of production they would soon decide to band together to sell their products collectively.

This proposed new organization might help if the farm boards already organized make sure that they are represented at the founding convention in sufficient numbers to help sway its policies.

One thing that wasn't emphasized in the reports from people studying the cause of low farm income was the fact that the higher income groups were under marketing boards and some quota allotments.

The most successful of these is the Ontario Flue-Cured Tobacco Growers' Marketing Board, which has just completed marketing \$140,000,000 worth of tobacco. This kind of achievement cannot be overlooked. Neither can the fact that other boards now under quota allotments are starting to have results that spell profit for their farmers.

There is no doubt that each child in this province is entitled to an equal opportunity of education no matter where he may live. However, it is time the tax burden was distributed equally amongst all citizens of the province.

The time for using the age old system of making the land taxpayers pay a certain percentage of the municipal costs has passed. The Ontario government in its takeover of many of the powers of individual municipalities has failed its electors in not taking over the complete cost of elementary and secondary education under the provincial budget. Under the present mobile society it is an impossible task for all to pay their share under the land tax system.
