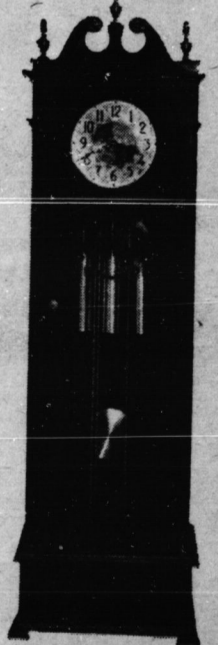

Stelco Plant Railway Line To Start Soon

SIMCOE — A railway spur line to service the Steel Company of Canada complex at Nanticoke is expected to get under way within the next four months.

The line will run eastward from Simcoe through Woodhouse Township to the Stelco property.

L.R. Smith, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway told about 50 Woodhouse Township farmers last night that the estimated cost of acquiring the land for the rail line is more than \$200,000.

Mr. Smith said he could give no estimate of the cost of construction.

Stelco had indicated the railway would be used next year to transport construction materials to the Nanticoke site.

Until 1975, only one train each way every day will travel over the tracks.

Mr. Smith assured the township residents level crossings at roadways would be protected if the vehicular traffic warranted it.

Many of the landowners expressed concern over sections of their farms being rendered useless with the rail line severing their properties.

One farmer said he would be "put out of business" if the railway went through his property.

He pointed out 12 acres of his 46-acre farm would be unworkable and the remainder was not large enough to accommodate his 21-head of cattle.

T.E. Margeson, CPR lawyer, said there are instances when the railway purchases property which becomes useless to the landowner.

One group was advised the company does compensate the farmer for damages resulting from a rail line crossing his property. Each case is dealt with on an individual basis.

The farmers were told the rail line would not interfere with natural water courses

and precautions would be taken to prevent erosion along embankments.

Mr. Smith said that there was no doubt the locating of Stelco at Nanticoke would attract related industries to the area.

He told the land-owners the town of Simcoe recently requested the rail line be constructed to service the local industrial parks.

Company and town officials will meet in the near future to discuss the proposal.

Mr. Smith said application for permission to construct and operate the rail line would be made to the board of transport commissioners in the near future.

He told the landowners that representative from the real estate firm handling negotiations for acquisitions of the property required on which to construct the rail line would be in the area soon to discuss options on the land.
