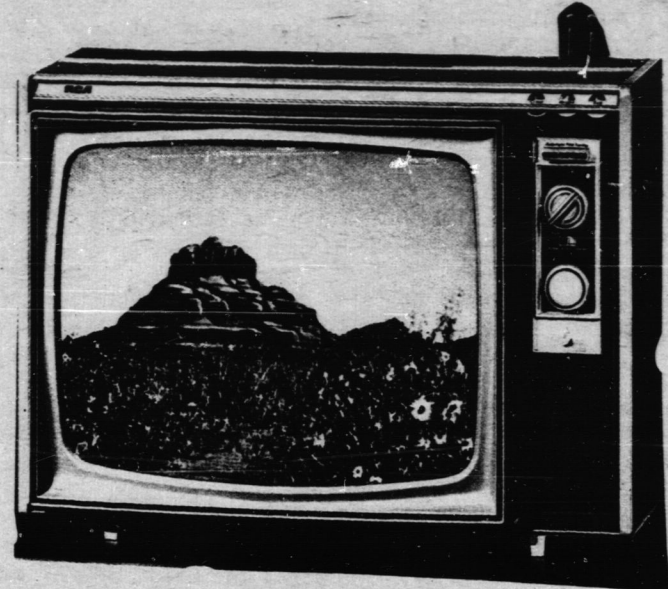

Dynamic Public Relations Work Shop Held

The importance of the individual leader as a public relations representative of the Girl Guides of Canada was emphasized strongly at the Public Relations Workshop presented by the Ontario Provincial Public Relations Committee on March 29 at the Niagara College in Welland. Mrs. B. Lindsay, Hamilton area commissioner, stressed the fact that the general public often see the organization through the leader. Many visual aids were used by Mrs. Lindsay who was assisted by Mrs. Leigh Hodgson, Niagara Area public relations representative in the presentation of basic Guiding knowledge and insignia. A breakdown of the profit from the sale of Girl Guide cookies showed that almost sixty per cent per box. A portion of this goes to the individual Guide Companies and Brownie Packs while the rest supports the Haldimand Division, Niagara area and the province. The Christie Brown company receives 41.7 per cent and from this they supply all the sales aids necessary to a district. During the afternoon the leaders were divided into groups to make a display concerning the Guide movement suitable for a store window or a banquet. The leaders learned that simplicity is the keyword in making a display.

As an epilogue, a lively skit was presented by the Welland-On-Canal players, which demonstrated the importance of public relations to the Guide Company meeting, an image of Guiding is projected to any guests present. Mrs. R. Booth, Provincial Deputy for Ontario was present for the workshop as well as Mrs. D. Adkinson of Cayuga, Niagara Area

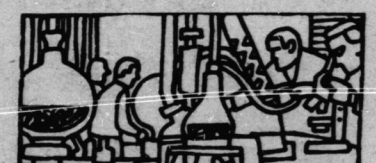
