Editorial Comment

Haldimand-Norfolk Plans Unclear

IN ACCORDANCE with the suggestion of Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy McKeough, a conference of county officials of Norfolk and Haldimand counties was held at Cayuga recently for the purpose of forming a joint planning board.
While officials of the two counties expressed a

mutual desire to co-operate in this regard, considerable misunderstanding seemed in evidence as to the manner in which this board should be set up, with whom this board would proceed with its planning and just what subjects would be tackled first.

For instance, it was reported that Haldimand county had already engaged the services of a firm of planning consultants, Just how this move would fit into the government's action in naming a co-ordinator for this project in the person of Mr. Nigel Richardson, with a small staff to carry out a three-year survey in co-operation with government departments officials of the two counties, it was not exactly clear.

The intercounty board was left more or less hanging in the air until certain points could be clarified. It seems that the government has not exactly impressed local county officials by the arbitrary manner in which it has acted on regional government generally and the Norfolk-Haldimand project in particular. Mr. McKeough was quoted as giving three years for the planning process and another year for its implementation. But he was also quoted as declaring that regional governments must come into being by 1971, which happens to be the year in which the next provincial election would be ordinarily

A failure to effect good public relations and to inform local municipalities generally on the plans for regional government was pinpointed during the discussion by various officials of both counties. There seems keen resentment not only here but elsewhere in the province at the sudden takeover of the whole local assessment program across Ontario by the provincial government, as announced by Finance Minister Charles MacNaughton in his budget address. Likewise the rather abrupt disbandment by Hon. William Davis of all local school boards in favor of county school boards, with a sudden skyrocketing of costs to local taypayers for educational purposes, has left a bad taste. Numerous protests have gone forward to Queen's Park on these two key issues as well as on the manner in which regional government is being introduced without resort to the

So far as Haldimand and Norfolk are concerned, they appear ready and willing to work together to evolve the most desirable plans for accommodation of the new era of development ensured by the Hydro and Stelco plants. At the same time county officials of both of these historic counties have expressed concern and alarm lest part of their traditional areas be appropriated by nearby cities in the regional government shuffle. Haldimand is wary of Hamilton embracing some of its townships near to that metropolis. Norfolk is equally apprehensive lest this county he swallowed up in a new region with Brantford as its captial. Voices are heard to the west in favor of taking over the Walsinghams,

Houghton and Middleton. It seems too bad that this regional government scheme has opened up a whole Pandora's box of problems and troubles at a time when the principal concern should be to plan to properly pave the way for orderly development of the residential, commercial and industrial growth which wili follow the new complex of industry in Woodhouse and Walpole townships On the other hand, Hon. Darcy McKeough evidently considers it a heaven-sent opportunity to tailor a brand new area for regional government. There seems little recourse for the counties of Norfolk and Haldimand but to co-operate with the government officials to the best of their ability. Nevertheless this should not debar a free and full expression of opinion on the part of the two counties' representatives as to the future of Norfolk and Haldimand in the program that may be formulated.

With the expansion of population and industry projected by this area in the years ahead, unquestionably the Norfolk-Haldimand population will attain the required minimum figure of 150,000 to qualify as a distinct region in the new regional government setup. There will therefore be no necessity of linking up these two historic old counties with any cities or parts of the other counties. Some assurance that the two counties will be maintained intact to administer their joint affairs and to work out the best plan for the new industrialized area of the two counties would go far towards ensuring whole-hearted co-operation with the provincia authorities ad their officials.
