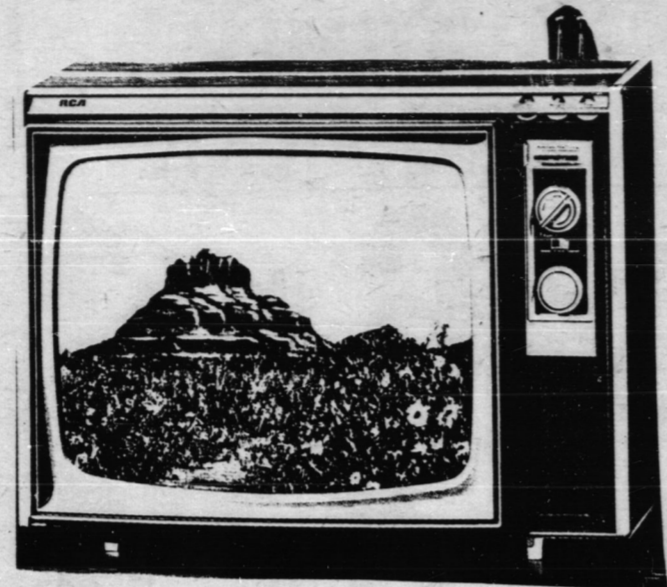

Cayuga Detachment Has Motorcycle Unit

The week of April 6-12, 1969, officers of the Cayuga Detachment investigated a total of 8 accidents, one being a personal injury accident and causing injuries to 1 person. Officers patrolled a total of 6,535 miles issuing 35 warnings and 38 charges for various infractions of the Highway Traffic Act. As a result of 4 Liquor Control Act Investigations, 6 persons were charged. In Provincial Judge's Court on Thursday, April 10th, 25 convictions were registered for this detachment.

Other occurrences investigated were 3 break-ins, 1 theft and officers answered 14 requests for assistance. Constable W. D. BROUGHTON recovered a stolen car from Moulton Township. The Cayuga Detachment strength was increased effective April 14th, when Constable Dale RYAN, a native of Belleville, was transferred from Smithville Detachment. Constable RYAN was stationed at Smithville for the last 14 months and prior to that he was a Civilian Radio Operator

at Belleville for 3 years. Constable RYAN recently completed a 3 week Motorcycle Course at the Ontario Police College, Aylmer, Ontario. This is the first time in 15 years that there has been a Motorcycle Unit at Cayuga Detachment. Constable RYAN's duties will consist mainly of Highway Patrol.

Woodhouse Is Considering Second Gas Co. Franchise

During the regular April meeting of Woodhouse Township Council, some discussion arose concerning the natural gas rights and pipelines with the township. For some time council members of the rural municipality have been considering requests from Glenard Limited, gas drillers and suppliers, for permission to lay pipelines along township roads on road allowance property. Briefly, council has agreed, with the provision that adjoining property owners must be allowed to pipe gas into their homes from these mains.

At the meeting last week, Glenard Limited informed council by letter they had permission from the Energy Board to sell gas commercially. It was nevertheless pointed out to council by Clerk Ken Hall that an agreement with Woodhouse should be necessary. The clerk said the Glenard Co. wanted a 'loose' agreement, but added that would not prove beneficial to the municipality.

Council agreed to arrange a meeting with the Co. president, John Vail, and legal counsel, to see what type of agreement can be worked out, but taking into consideration present
