between the Atlantic provinces and the western region of Alberta - B.C. - Yukon.

The major change comes when the rates for the ninety-two million parcels mailed and delivered in Canada each year will be revised. Under the new rates, the minimum charge will be forty-five cents for a one-to-two pound parcel within a zone and the maximum will be three dollars and fifty-five cents for a twenty-five pound item.

The increase in domestic surface parcel post rate is calculated to bring revenues and expenditures into line in this category of post office operations, in contrast to an estimated deficit, before the rate changes, of \$8.7 million in the fiscal year 1969-70. The effect of this change, in the fiscal year 1970-71, is calculated at \$14.7 million.

In announcing the revisions, Mr. Kierans noted that parcels weighing up to six pounds make up approximately eighty percent of Canadian parcel post traffic and that increases in these weight ranges will vary from ten to twenty cents per parcel. The impact of this individual who mails a half-dozen one-to-two pound parcels a year, is estimated at one dollar per person per year.

Included in the new rate structure is an adjustment of the surface parcel post rates to and from Canadian Forces Post Offices and Fleet Mail

Also on October 1st, parcel rates to the United States will be increased, to bring an additional \$1.4 million in revenue over a 12-month period. The minimum rate will remain at 15c up to one-half pound, while for items from eight oz. to a pound it will be 75c as compared to the present 45c. From there on the rates will be applied in a simple progression of 25c for each additional pound or fraction thereof.

The changes announced will allow the post office to improve its financial position without creating a substantial increase to the general public. The advance notice to large mailers will allow them to make the necessary adjustments in their arrangements well ahead of time.

At the same time, in order to simplify the rate structure, the current Air Parcel Post (Domestic) category will be abolished, since the category became redundant late in 1968 when air transmission was extended to all domestic first class mail. Air parcels now receive the same handling, dispatch and transportation priorities as first class mail and post office customers will be able to secure air transmission of parcels by normal first class postage rates.

Stack Will Dominate Nanticoke Shoreline

The giant multi-flue stack at Ontario Hydro's Nanticoke power plant on Lake Erie will tower 655 feet. Rising swiftly at the rate of 100 feet a week, it will be the first of its type to reach this height on the continent.

Crews from Canadian Kellogg Limited, Toronto, are working 24 hours a day, five days a week, in the continuous slip form method of placing concrete. In this photo the \$2 million stack, shown alongside framework for one of the four boiler housings, is about 200 feet high. It is to be finished in early September.

A reinforced concrete shell will reach 635 feet. Four mild-steel flues, one for each generating unit, are built within the shell and extend another 20 feet above it. With four separate flues inside the single stack, the concentration of heat forces higher dispersion of gases into the upper atmosphere.

Power from the first unit is due in 1971. Remaining units will feed power into the full two million kilowatts capacity is reached.

Merchants Edge Smithville

The Jarvis Merchants came from behind a 2-1 deficit in the late innings to nip Smithville 4-2 in 10 innings in an interlocking fastball game at Victoria Park in Hamilton last Friday night.

Jarvis scored a run in the second inning when Hub Fehrman doubled, moved to third on a sacrifice and came riding home on a base hit by Ted Phibbs.

The lead was short-lived however, as the Juniors came right back with two runs in the third inning.

With two out and a man on first via a base on balls, Mike Zulik belted a home run to give Smithville a 2-1 lead.

Both pitchers (Zulik of Smithville and John Edwards of Jarvis) then clamped down on baserunners and it wasn't until the ninth inning that Jarvis scored another run to tie the game.

Bill Prince led off the inning with a triple and after Zulik whiffed the next two batters, Edwards singled to centre to send the game into extra innings.

For the second time in less than a week, the Merchants scored two quick runs in the first extra inning to win the ball game.

With one out, Laird More drew a base on balls and moved to third on a base hit by Bill Fallis. The latter went to second on the throw into third.

Joe Clark then bounced one back to the pitcher, Zulik, who hurried his throw and threw it wild at the plate, allowing More to score.

Fallis scored the fourth Jarvis run when Bill Prince flied to short left field.

John Edwards went all the way on the mound for Jarvis to pick up his eighth victory of the season against three defeats. He gave up only three hits while striking out eight and walking three.

Mike Zulik was the hard-luck loser. He pitched well enough to win almost any game as he struck out 18 would-be Jarvis hitters. He gave up five safeties and issued only two bases on balls over the 10-inning contest.

Fisherville has dropped out of the League and

consequently have forfeited their two rained-out games to Jarvis.

This leaves Jarvis one game behind league-leading Dundas with the final first place battle coming up this weekend.

On Saturday night Dundas will be here at 8:30 p.m., and Sunday night the two teams will return to Dundas for the second half of the back-to-back showdown for the League title.

Next Wednesday night the Merchants will open their defence of the O.A.S.A. Intermediate "A" Championship when they will travel to either Burlington or Oakville. The second game of the series will be back in Jarvis on Saturday, August 30. Burlington won the first game of this series by the score of 14-1.
