Henry Thompson passed away in his seventy-fourth year at the Dunnville Hospital on Mon., Dec. 8, 1969.

Mr. Thompson was born in London, England, March 29, 1895 and emigrated to Canada as a young lad. He served in the Canadian Armed Forces during the First World War.

In 1922 he married Eva Cromie who predeceased him Sept. 2, 1967. Their children are, Betty (Mrs. George Hill) of Corrua, Robert of Port Dover, Keith of Caledonia, and the late Fred Thompson of Jarvis. He is survived by 19 grandchildren.

After having farmed Tillsonburg until 1958, he moved to Selkirk for 12 years. He was employed at the Jarvis Airport and the Hagersville Army where he was an active member of the Canadian Legion, the Baptist Church and Senior Citizens of Selkirk.

He rested at the Mott Funeral Home, Hagersville, where the service was held at 2 p.m., following cremation. Interment at a later date at the United Church Cemetery.

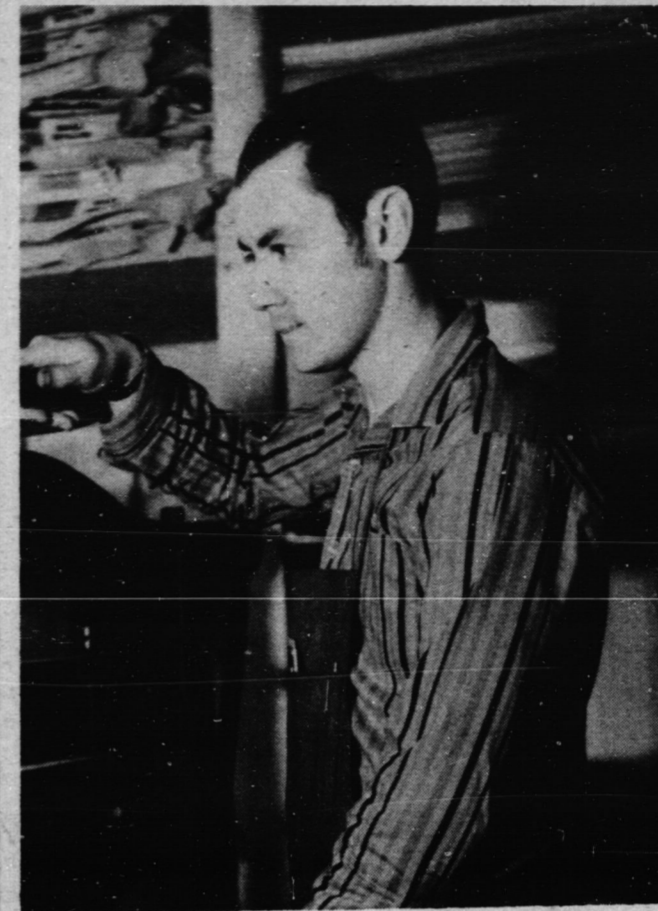

Licence Plates Now On Sale

Ontario's 1970 licence plates for passenger cars, dual cycle vehicles and motorcycles go on sale this week at 281 issuing offices in the province.

The plates will be blue on white, the reverse of this year's colours. Deadline date for having the new plates will be Saturday, February 28, when 1969 plates will expire. There will be no extension.

The total number of cylinders, if manufactured after 1933, \$20.00; four cylinders, if manufactured or before 1933, \$8.00; motorcycles, \$10.00.

Transport officials noted that motorists can gain in convenience and peace of mind by getting their plates in the first few weeks, avoiding the last minute line-ups.

In cases where the ownership of a used motor vehicle is being transferred at the time of registration, a certificate of mechanical fitness is required to get new plates.

No certificate is needed for normal purchases of plates, renewing existing ownership with no transfer involved. Used motor vehicles licensed previously in another province also require a certificate of mechanical fitness on being registered in Ontario and new plates issued for the first time.

1969 plates for trucks, buses and trailers will expire March 31, 1970. Operators are advised to consult their local licence issuing agent for details concerning registration dates for commercial vehicles.

Many thanks to the Caledonia Presbyterian Church for the use of their hall. This was greatly appreciated.

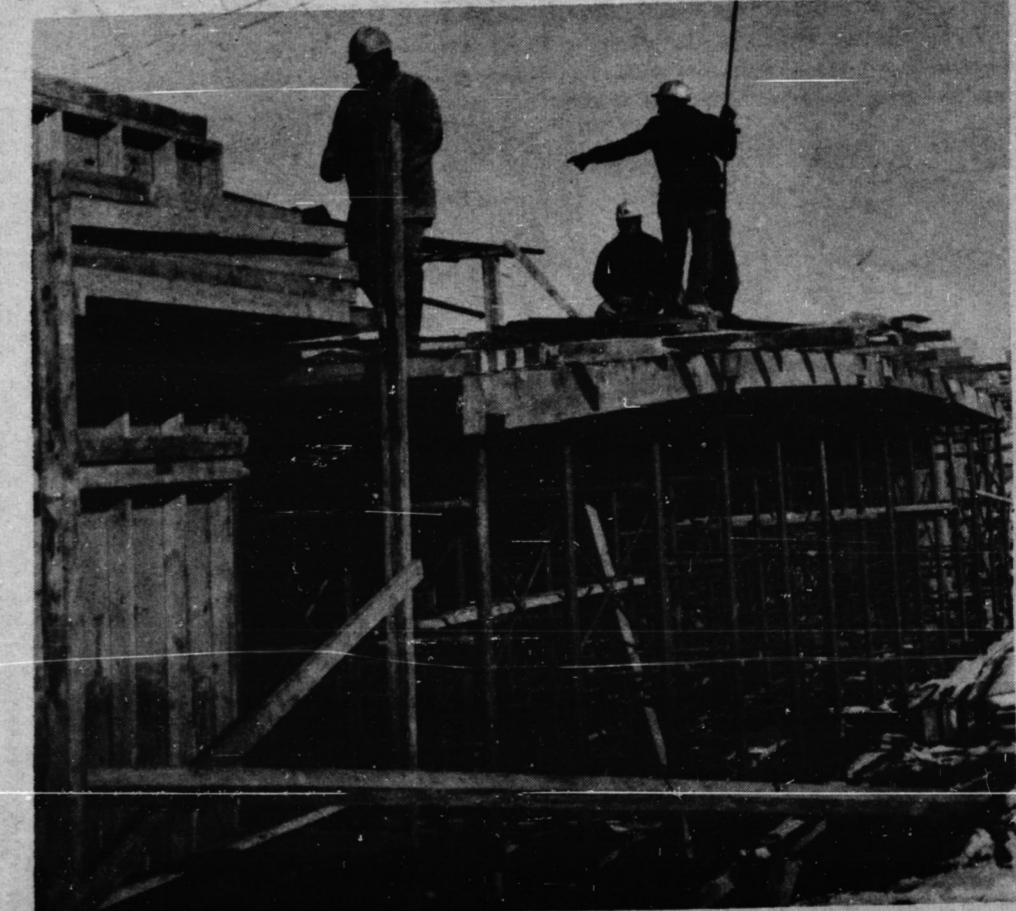
Next week, the quartet of George, Bob, Bob and Delos are travelling to Paris to entertain at the Holstein Breeders Convention.
