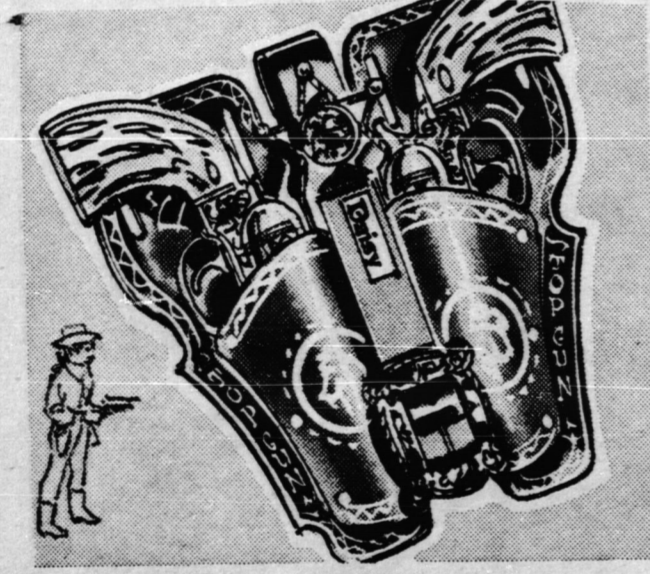

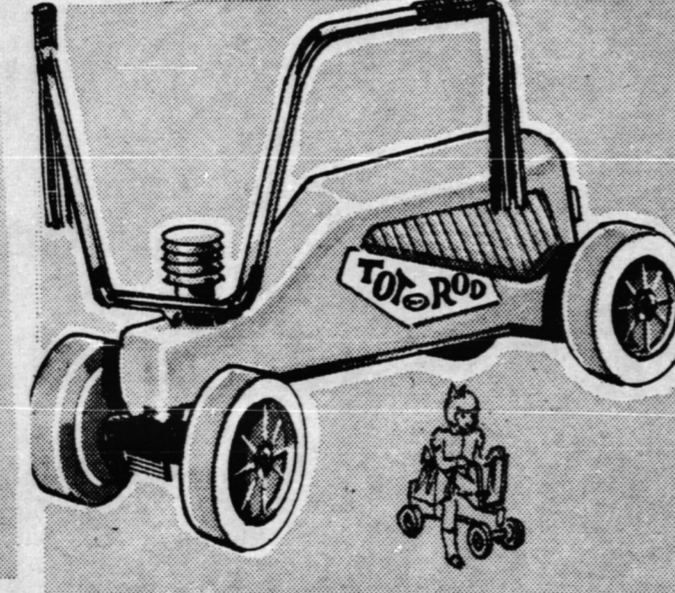

Jarvis Gets New Reeve By Acclamation

Dr. W. E. Austin was acclaimed Reeve of the village after three others withdrew their nominations.

Others nominated Monday were Reeve E. W. Craddock, W. E. Austin, W. James Davidson and John Brintnell.

There also will be no election for council as only four qualified.

These are W. James Davidson, Klaus Druyff, John Brintnell and Charles 'Ted' Oldham. Others nominated were Harold Fess and E. A. Craddock.

Retiring Reeve and Warden, Ernest Craddock, received a standing ovation.

Dr. Austin told the nomination meeting: "It might be the time to start thinking of getting our own police department."

He said we may have two new subdivisions very soon that will require additional water and sewer facilities.

"This will mean that the lagoon will have to be enlarged to an additional four acres.

"We first require new zoning laws in order for the village to control the developments.

"This causes some red tape but this is necessary for an orderly growth," he said.

He also expressed his request about the resignation of Mr. Craddock after nine years of service as Reeve.

Other speakers who accepted nomination for council expressed thanks to the custodian of the Jarvis Community Centre and to Clerk-Treasurer Bob Lysch.

Newcomer Mr. Oldham said he accepted the nomination "because he lives in Jarvis and likes it here."

Mr. Craddock in his remarks to the meeting, said he was sorry to see the erosion of municipal control.

He said he regretted Haldimand's biggest loss last year with the death of Laird Miller. He said the meeting was honored with the presence of two former wardens, George Walker and Lea Marshall.
