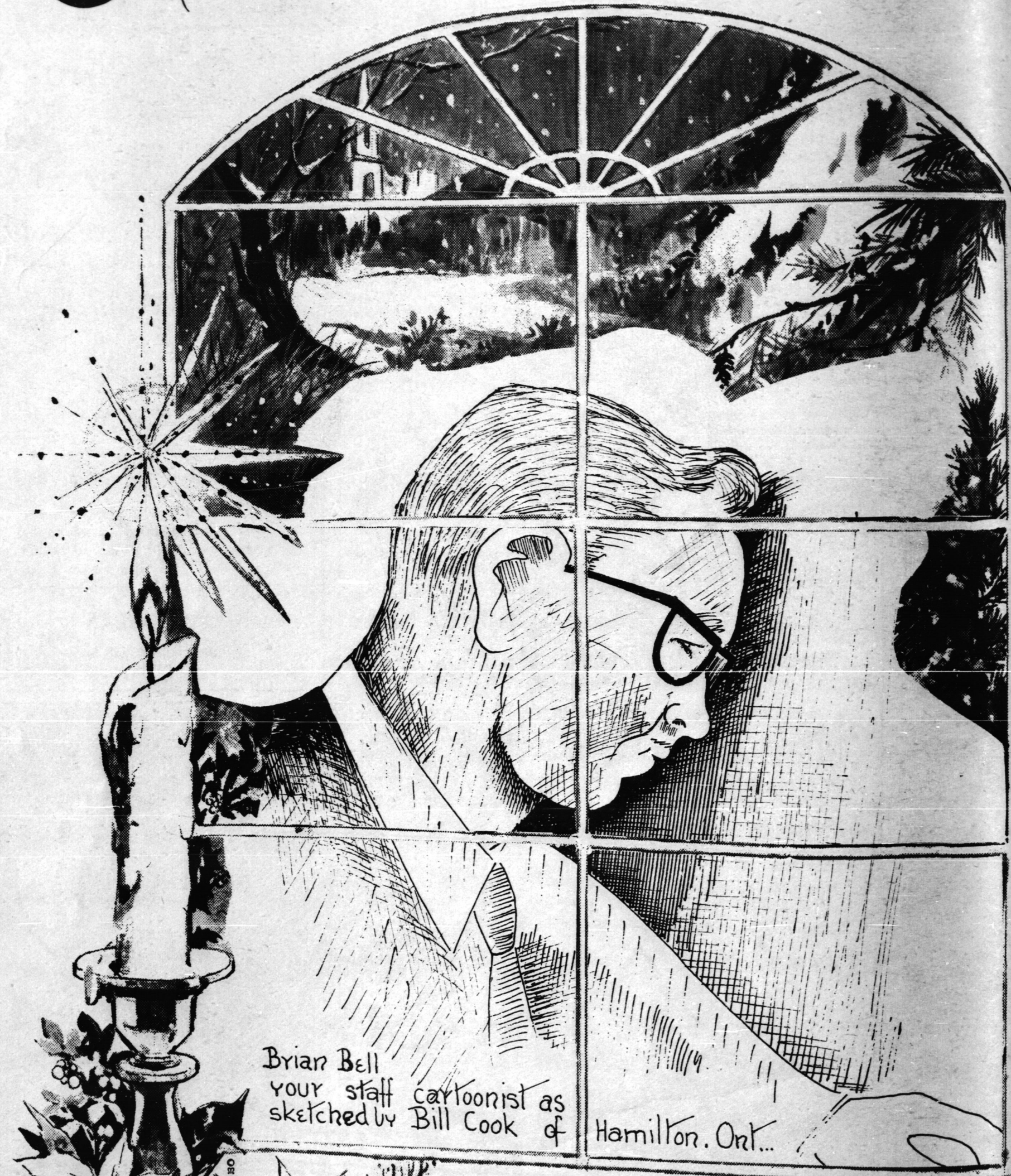

More Cash From Apartment Dwellers

Ontario apartment dwellers should receive a little more cash from their landlords this month - maps in time for Christmas.

The extra cash is a benefit which virtually all home owners and tenants are entitled under the Ontario government's two-year-old property tax reduction program. The system was established by the Province last year as a means of easing the burden of municipal and school taxes. In effect, the Province pays part of the property taxes on each eligible house and apartment.

Under Provincial law, apartment landlords or their agents must pass on the tax reduction to tenants on or before December 31, 1969. (Home owners should have already received their reductions.)

The system works this way: The landlord receives the reduction from his municipality and is required to pass on the full amount of the reduction on or before December 31 to those tenants who have occupied their premises throughout 1969. Tenants who have moved in or out of apartments during the year receive only proportionate amounts.

A tenant who moved into an apartment during the year and is still occupying the premises should receive one-twelfth of the total reduction for each month of tenancy. This reduction should be paid by the landlord on or before December 31.

A tenant who moved out during the year should receive a similarly proportionate amount within 30 days of the date he terminated his tenancy or on December 31st, whichever is earlier.

Two Health Offices Proposed For Haldimand

The Haldimand-Norfolk medical officer of health, Dr. H. H. Washburn, is once again campaigning for additional health units to be located in Haldimand.

The doctor in a report to the community services subcommittee of the Haldimand-Norfolk joint study committee, predicted the need for additional health units to keep up with an expected population explosion because of up-coming industrial developments in the county. The doctor suggested the units be located in Dunville and in Hagersville because they would be near to existing hospitals. He said a Cayuga office could be phased out once the others were in operation.

A similar request by the doctor to Haldimand county council last year was tabled. It was later rejected when the joint county systems were formed.

To Get Retroactive Pay Carpenters At Nanticoke Settle Pay Dispute

NANTICOKE Carpenters and Hydro settled their dispute over an unsigned working agreement Tuesday. The Record has learned.

The carpenters walked off their jobs at the construction site of the Nanticoke generating station at coffee break time last Thursday. The workers returned to work on Friday, also at coffee break time, but no settlement had been made.

The workers claimed the agreement hadn't been signed by Hydro that would give the men retroactive pay until May 1 and they were not receiving travel expenses for the same reason.

A Hydro spokesman told The Record by phone from Toronto today that the agreement had been signed Tuesday morning by both the President of International Carpenters and Joiners of America and Hydro officials.

The Hydro spokesman said it wasn't hydro that was holding up instituting the agreement but it was awaiting the signature of the International President of the union.

The Carpenters at Nanticoke, members of Local 18, settled a new contract with Hydro in Hamilton in August. They claimed that Hydro refused to pay a 75-cent an hour retroactive increase.

Robert McGhie, the Local's chief steward, said Thursday the Hamilton based local that stretches to Nanticoke had been working on the site for a year and a half without a contract.

The two parties had negotiated a contract but it wasn't signed until Tuesday.

The Hydro spokesman said the signing should clear up the matter. Workers under the contract will also get 12 cents a mile travelling expense.
