

TEATIME TOPICS

If you take your turkey apart immediately after the big holiday dinner, it's easier to store and the leftovers may taste better. The Poultry Products Institute home economist Dorothy Batcheller says dressing may take a long time to cool down if left in a turkey, and there is a chance of off flavors

developing. She recommends a post-dinner procedure that makes use of as much of the bird as possible.

Leave Whole
Don't slice large pieces of meat, pull them off the carcass whole for storage. You may reheat them in foil with dressing, broil them with barbecue sauce until hot and lightly browned. You may dip them in a batter or egg

and crumbs and fry in deep fat or coat them with mayonnaise and serve on lettuce garnished with chopped toasted almonds. Smaller chunks may be diced for a la kings, salads, sandwiches or casseroles. Tidbits and skin may be used in soup or ground and used in croquettes or sandwiches.

Wrap Well
Wrap meat and dressing in separate foil or waxed paper package or place in covered refrigerator dishes. Store in refrigerator or other cold spot and use up within a few days. For longer storage, wrap for freezing, freeze and store for use within four weeks.

When you make sandwiches with leftovers, try dressing may be reheated in foil by itself or with turkey or served cold with sliced turkey or added to turkey sandwiches.

Gravy may be reheated for hot turkey sandwiches, added to soup or served with reheated turkey and dressing.

30 to 40 minutes. Strain, add any bits of meat from the bones. Cool and refrigerate. Use for base of jellied turkey or casseroles, as part of liquid in a la king sauce or as a soup with diced vegetables and rice added.

You can use turkey as a dunker at a party. Arrange bite-sized cubes of cooked turkey and food picks around a bowl of cocktail sauce made by seasoning chili sauce with horseradish and a dash of hot pepper sauce. Guests then spear a cube of turkey and dunk it in the sauce.

If you are going to make soup with the bones, you may break them up and store them for two or three days or make broth immediately. Just cover bones with water in a deep kettle, add seasonings, a carrot, sliced onion, celery leaves or a couple of stalks and piece of bay leaf. Simmer covered for one and a half or two hours or pressure cook

If your tree is a gas only indirect lighting be used to brighten it. Have Christmas tree festooned around it, can cause electric shock. Check all lighting for frayed wires, connections or sockets if you have a tree with direct lighting. All lights should be off at the power source whenever the house empty or when every retired for the night.

If possible, use non-combustible materials such as glass, metal and stone for decorations. Dispose of all gift tags promptly, in the outside, rather than in livingroom fireplace.
