Industrial Board Needed Our community is bristling with real estate. Practically every open piece of property within the limits and surrounding areas have been sold during the last six months by development firms or speculators.

This should be indication enough to our municipal council that careful step by step planning is necessary to ensure an orderly growth of the community.

Many municipalities that are experiencing fast growth, such as that has been predicted for our community, have found that real estate prices get out of hand and home building lots get priced out of range of ordinary workman.

It may be worthwhile for this community to consider owning some of its own land for both the purpose of subdivision and industrial sites.

There is no doubt small industry would consider being in Jarvis if there was serviced land available at a reasonable cost.

Such a program would be worthwhile even though it added the pressure of the developments to the village but it might be advantageous to go a step further and create an industrial board. Such a board would be allocated funds and take the responsibility of buying and selling land.

Citizens are urged to support the club in its efforts to better the community. The club's activities in the past, such as the promotion of minor sports and the installation of flood lights at the soft ball diamond, would show the club is making a big effort to make this community a better place in which to live.

Haldimand County 4-H Homemaking Clubs will be taking the project "Separates for Summer" this spring. Two local Leaders' Training Schools were held at the Rural Youth Centre, Kohler on January 21 and 22, and January 23 and 24, 1969.

During this project club girls will learn sewing techniques to make summer sports outfits; how to dress suitably for various occasions and selecting clothes to suit the figure. Club girls will have a choice of making one of the following garments: pant dress, tunic dress and shorts, culottes and a top, or skirt and top and shorts coordinated.

Any girl between the ages of 12 and 26 years is eligible to join a 4-H Homemaking Club.
