## Trailer Subdivision Okay If Properly Controlled

WALPOLE TOWNSHIP — A proposed subdivision for trailer homes near Springvale is facing opposition from Walpole Township council.

The fully-serviced, 25-acre subdivision, announced last month, was suggested as an answer to the transient labor problem the township faces because of industrial development.

Councillors fear the trailer park may become a haven for transients and drifters. They feel controls must be tough to prevent a sloppy appearance.

"If it's put in with proper facilities and a bylaw to hold it, then I'm in favor of it," Reeve Hugh Greenfield said.

"But we want bylaws that have teeth. I wouldn't want a trailer camp next to me if it was the kind of camp that I know."

Except for a small section it will contain immobile trailers supplied by the developers.

The Balance allows for mobile trailers expected to be connected with construction of industrial plants by the Steel Company of Canada and related industries.

Minimum lot size for the trailers averaging about 720 sq. ft. in size. The trailer park may eventually be turned into a subdivision of single homes.

Council acted on the recommendation of Walpole planning board, which approved the subdivision in principle Thursday.

Council plans to obtain more information from the developers and make it available to nearby residents.

This includes 316 fluid, 306 industrial and 100 cream shippers. Even with this reduction of herds, the number of dairy herds on O.P. or D.H.I.A. is just under 14 per cent of the total.

The Haldimand Milk Committee has agreed to spearhead a campaign to increase the number of herds.

**Haldimand Dairy Farmers Declining**

Some 110 dairy farmers in Haldimand are going out of business every year.

This is disclosed by Ken Best, Ontario Agricultural representative for the county.

He said that a Dominion Bureau of Statistics census taken in June, 1966, showed there were 1,200 dairy farmers in the county.

In a recent survey by the Ontario Milk Marketing Board indicated there are only 722 still in the business. This included 316 fluid producers, 306 industrial and 100 cream shippers.

Mr. Best said the dairy farmers are quitting in large numbers because of the demand of larger operations in the economic squeeze to produce more profit.

Small farms are being forced to quit because they can't make enough to survive, he said.

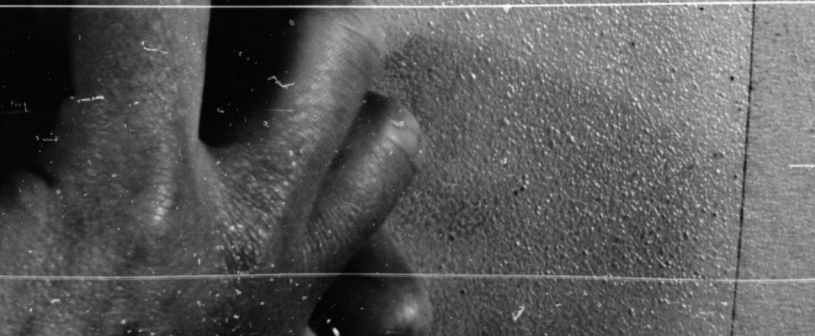
