This is not intended to be a chronological review of the past year but rather a few comments on some of the happenings, and the most noteworthy came at the end of the year.

The journey to the moon by three men in the Apollo 8 space craft was undoubtedly the big event of the year in world news. It was a stupendous achievement, not only for the men who went but also for the men who designed and built the vehicle. However, I cannot help wondering what real good it did. Just to accomplish something no one has ever done does not seem to justify the millions of dollars it cost, and the risk of human life involved. It is of no particular military value, the U.S. can drop a nuclear bomb on Moscow any time it feels like it. To land a man on the moon if it can be done, would involve more millions and what good would it do? I think that the money would have been better spent relieving poverty, paying students university fees and so on.

For Canada, the outstanding event was the spectacular rise of Pierre Elliott Trudeau. Certainly Canada never had such a remarkable man as its Prime Minister and I doubt whether any other country ever did. The great question is "How will he make out?" That he is a very able man is obvious. For one thing, a man who can enforce his will on a cabinet that contains such strong men as Paul Hellyer, Mitchell Sharp and the others shows that he has ability far beyond the average. To me, the big question is whether or not he will last. Up till now his interests have shifted several times and he has been several times in turn, in the stand the long grind of four years in one job. I cannot help thinking of him as a small child, as long as it is setting its own way, it is all smiles and good-will, but try to check it and then "Waaaaa". I hope I am wrong, but his marvelous ability, combined following and personal characteristics, all point to some kind of dictatorship.

Two assassinations in the United States were not only personal losses, but may have changed the course of history. Martin Luther King was a great man who exerted a profound influence on both the black and the white populations of the U.S. Once the area of

his martyrdom has dimmed, the memory of it may read the negroes to greater violence, but there is also the possibility that, being dead, he may exert greater influence than when he was a controversial figure. Some one has said that if Robert Kennedy had not been killed, he would today be the President of the United States. That is only guess work, but not too far off. Had he lived and become the President then world history would have been quite different from what it will be under Nixon.

Among European events was the suppression of freedom in Czechoslovakia by the Russian invasion of that country. I feel quite sure that the chief reasons for the Russian action were these: Walter Ulbricht, (Ulbricht) the ruler of East Germany, was terribly afraid that if the Czechs were allowed to make such democratic reforms, his own people (East Germans) would demand the same and that this would lead to union with West Germany. From the Russian point of view the main reason was military defence. Czechoslovakia is a key area in the Warsaw line of defence, if that went the road to Moscow was wide open.

Perhaps the most sinister thing that came out of the crisis was the Russian statement that they had the right to enter any satellite country that deviated from the strict Communist line. That is the same as saying that the British Government has the right to invade Zambia or Nigeria if they made vital changes in their constitution.

I am not much of a sports addict, but I do have the radio going and I notice that Canadian men won no gold medals at the winter or summer Olympics in Canada. It was some but it was the ladies and the horses that did it, not the men. It seems as though Canada's men athletes have some hard work in front of them.

O.P.P. REPORT —

Three youths from the Six Nations Indian Reserve, were arrested as a result of an Assault and Robbery with Violence occurring in the Township on January 4, 1969. The victim was hospitalized. Constable P. E. Scully is investigating. Other occurrences investigated during the past week included 3 thefts and 2 break and enters. Constable W. L. Bessey is investigating a hunting accident which occurred on January 3rd in Dunn Township resulting in injuries to an area youth.

Officers investigated a total of 11 accidents during the past week, 3 being personal injury causing minor injuries to 7 persons. During a patrol of 4,555 miles, officers issued 16 warnings and 8 Highway Traffic Act charges. One driver was charged with Impaired Driving and a person was charged under the Liquor Control Act. In Provincial Judges Court on Thursday, January 2, 1969, 13 convictions were registered for this Detachment.

Over the Christmas and New Years Holiday periods, the number of accidents and occurrences reported were very minor.

ASKS APPROVAL FOR TRAILER HOME VILLAGE

The Pearce Construction Company has asked the Walpole Township Council for approval in principle for a trailer park, which may eventually be turned into a subdivision of single family dwelling houses.

Charles Pearce, President of the Construction Company has a plan for a fully serviced twenty-five acre subdivision for trailer homes near Springvale.

The plan is to provide accommodations for the anticipated employees of the Ontario Hydro and St. Lawrence projects on the shores of Lake Erie.

The Township Council on Friday referred the sub-division plan to the Township Planning Board for further study.

Officials said the park, except for a small section, will contain immobile trailers supplied by a Toronto firm. The balance allows for mobile trailers.

These trailers can be rented or purchased and are proposed as an answer to the transient labor problem the Township faces because of industrial developments.
