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## AREA YOUTH BRAVE WINTER WEATHER TO ENJOY TOUR OF UNIVERSITIES

Saturday morning before 8 A.M. (January 11) 18 young people, and a clergyman, with a quiet, courageous bus driver, started out from the Walpole Township area to keep appointments with the Public Relations representatives of Waterloo Lutheran University and subsequently in the early afternoon with three members of the Circle "K" Club of the University of Waterloo.

Two main factors were pressing against following through on this venture: less than half of the minimum paying passengers were on board; the weather probe said, 20 to 30 mile N.W. winds, snow squalls and drifting in the North Waterloo area to which their trip was to take them.

As it became clear at the No. 6 Highway crossing and the "Rascals" pick-up point that no more passengers would be boarding the bus, a quick phone call, a vote of the people on board, decided that, having come this far, a turn-back would just sacrifice the money already paid in, they may as well go ahead.

The driver, Blake Smith of Hagersville, deserved every credit for seeing the trip through to the end, going and returning (6:30 P.M.).

One of the virtues in touring two universities was the manner in which people learn best by contrast.

At the Waterloo Lutheran University the tourists were met by the Director of Information, Mr. R. "Dick" Taylor and Mr. Barry Lyons, Director of Publications. These two gentlemen conducted the party through a complex that seemed to be alive with students (a surprise for a Saturday morning).

Dr. Duncan A. MacLulich, Chairman of the Biology Faculty gave the visitors a vivid picture in equipment, specimens and a programming which emphasized a progressive, modern training for students from all over the world.

Mr. Steve Little met the group in one of the lecture rooms and presented them with an informal picture of the latest changes in admission and course availability. Mr. Little dropped his first surprise packet by informing them that a foreign language is no longer obligatory for a B.A. Degree. An average of 60% in four subjects and seven admission credits on the High School level including Grade 13 English will admit any student to a 4 or 5 year course in Liberal Arts, Business Administration, Science and others. In contrast to the non-obligatory foreign language policy is the developing practice of providing in-depth facilities for foreign language degree-work. This policy is directed from the indications that more and more Canada's Culture is becoming bilingual.

## OMBUDSMAN CATHERWOOD EXPLAINS DUTIES TO WOMENS INSTITUTE GROUP

In line with the yearly program for the Jarvis Women's Institute a Guest Speaker was suggested for the January meeting under the heading of Publicity. With this in mind the Jarvis Branch held an open meeting on Thursday afternoon last with Garnet and Sanduski branches as guests and the general public invited. Unfortunately the weather failed to cooperate and the attendance was very disappointing.

Ex-Sheriff Earl Catherwood was guest speaker, giving an outline of his work as Ombudsman or Director of Legal Aid for the County of Haldimand. He stated that of 46 Ombudsmen in Ontario appointed by the Upper Canada Law Society 43 were lawyers and expressed his confidence in this newly established office, whereby many persons against whom charges had been laid, received justice when a qualified legal defence was supplied, thus saving many particularly young and easily

led citizens from the stigma of a jail sentence. The legal advisor was allowed 25% of his regular fee as the defendant of one who could not afford help. In many cases the defendant repaid the amount in monthly installments. Mr. Catherwood cited cases during the time he was acting Sheriff when the Crown had a very weak case and if aid had been provided the person charged would have been acquitted.

Mr. Catherwood was introduced by Mrs. R. A. Miller and thanked by Mrs. Leonard Church who expressed the feeling of all present that they had received much useful information. She presented the speaker with a small gift and noted that the weather and attendance had been most disappointing.
