ideals, both closing with poems. Before the close of the meeting discussion centered around the proposed drastic rise in Estate Tax, which if allowed to pass would spell doom for the family farm. This bill as represented would be a severe blow to the Canadian economy. It has not yet become law, although it was introduced on October 22nd and will be threshed out at the next session of Parliament. There seems to be a lack of agreement in the reports of the contents of the Bill in various papers. It must be protested and the real contents made known to the general public.

At this point our groups found a welcome moment of just sitting down and watching the world in miniature meeting to share something that the UN might like to accomplish.

Rounding out the tour was an eye-opening invasion of the magnificent Phys. Ed. Complex. Eight squash courts, an Olympic size swim pool, a gymnasium to outreach anything we had seen or imagined. With a capacity for six basketball games going simultaneously, or the same kind of set-up for volleyball, the place seemed alive with healthy activity. We found ourselves believing him when one of our guides said that this set-up could seat a capacity of six thousand spectators for special sports indoors events.

During the second week in February FASS (Faculty, Administration, Staff, Students) a variety program satirizing the four areas of University life will be open to the public in the Arts Theatre (we couldn't get into this theatre Saturday because Pinocchio was being presented). There will be afternoon shows on Thursday and Friday and Saturday, with two shows (evenings) on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. FASS is basically a Charity Benefit operation and admission may be anything from 91c through 96c through a \$1.00.

The Arts Library in which our group had a chance to see a large University Research facilities at work is also open 24 hours a day through most of the week. 50,000 volumes are presently being added each year to this complex. It is often difficult to distinguish faculty from student. All are busy looking at cross-references, drawing out the varied opinions of the scholars, listening to tapes, viewing micro-films, all preparing personal conclusions that will shape government, industry, scientific direction, communications, education and the whole myriad pattern of civilization for decades to come.

We concluded this tour in one of the many coffee bars on the campus and all hoped to come back again for a more particularized initiation into the streams of learning experience that our modern department of education is subsidizing for all ages to day.

Question to a High-Schooler following the tour — "If you were going to one of the Universities we toured, which one would you choose?"

Answer — "I don't know. I'd sure like to attend the big one with all its tremendous facilities and varied courses — but maybe I'd get more study done in the smaller University — anyway, I've decided upon one thing (I wasn't sure about before) I do want to attend University."

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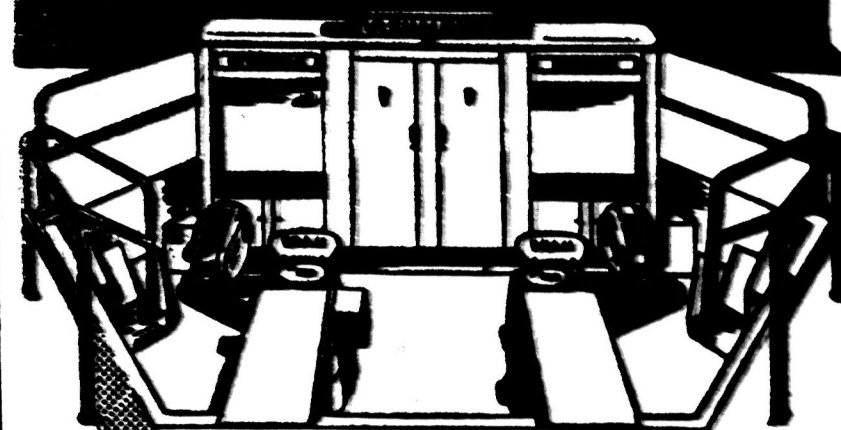
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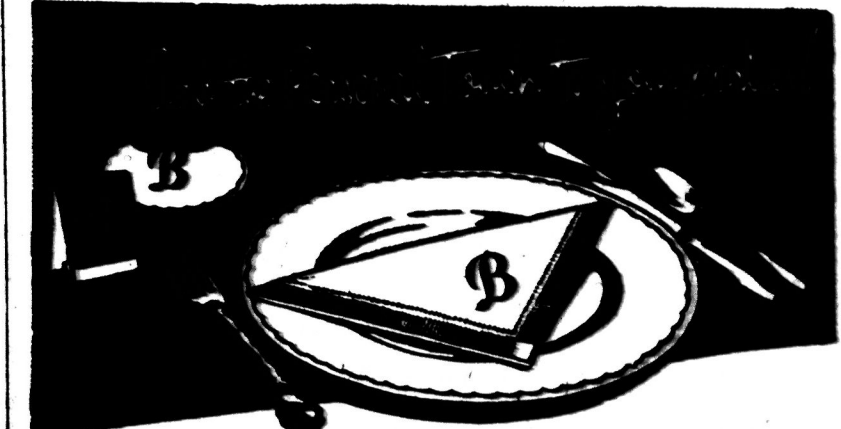
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
