## Haldimand Group Likes Farm Report

KOHLER — Haldimand County farmers Thursday took a short look at the report of the provincial government's committee on farm income and generally liked what they saw.

A four-man panel picked apart the report during the annual meeting of the Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association at the Kohler Agricultural Centre.

ALLAN MURRAY, secretary of Agriculture, said that effects of restricting entry into the farm industry might not be as serious as they initially appear.

"Some people have read into this that only those with a two-year course in agriculture or more will be able to farm," he said. "I don't think it will be this rough."

Panelist John Albin, of R.R. 3 Caledonia, said he favored merging Ontario farmers into a single farm organization, selling their products through a centralized food supply agency — a prime committee recommendation.
