Firemen, Workmen Search For Bodies

Dunnville (Special) — Firemen and workmen are still searching the rubble of the Victoria hotel today for more victims of a fire early Sunday morning.

The death toll has reached seven as three more bodies were found Tuesday in the burned out shell.

Police Chief George Rowe said that some of the victim's bodies may never be identified. The search job may not be completed for a couple of weeks as volunteers and municipal employees joined the search to thoroughly comb the ruins of the 63-year-old building.

All the bodies recovered were too badly burned to be identified. Police Chief George Rowe said Monday only two persons have so far officially reported to police they were registered in the hotel.

The hotel's register was lost in the blaze. Police estimate 43 persons were registered. Names of the missing have not been released. Chief Bowden described the 63-year-old hotel as "a

More than 100 firemen from surrounding towns helped Dunnville's three-truck brigade fight the 12-hour fire in five-degree weather. Water from fire hoses turned into blocks of ice on the walls of the building.

The search for bodies did not start until 15 hours after the fire and Chief Bowden said by the time the ruins were cool enough to search, bodies were frozen into the ashes.

Cause of the fire has not been determined but the chief said it appeared it started beside a basement furnace. Investigators from the Ontario fire marshal's office in Toronto have been called.

The fire also damaged a Toronto-Dominion Bank branch, a barber shop, dentist's office and the town's only theatre.

Norman Greer turned in the alarm when he noticed a glow in a second-floor window. He drove two blocks to tell police.

"I looked down the street and everything seemed fine." Constable Jake Feronshuizen said. "Then there was an explosion and the whole roof went straight up in the air."

Housekeeping personnel must be orientated and taught that their responsibilities are not only cleanliness, but that they must also learn how to interate with patients when performing their tasks within the patient areas.

The housekeeping department must also integrate with nursing personnel on the special claning tasks of places such as the operating room, delivery room, and other specialized areas. There must be routines for cleaning patient rooms, containing beds, bedside units, etc., also the proper cleaning of bed pans, urinals, wheel chairs, stretchers, oxygen tents, which are the responsibility of this department.

The housekeeper is also responsible for most of the paper purchases of the hospital; such items as toilet rolls and numerous sizes of paper bags, used for many different purposes.

When one considers a housekeeping department, one immediately thinks of keeping the place neat and tidy. These are merely technical items that must be included in the much broader functions of the department. The housekeeper must know and understand the composition of all floor and wall areas he will be called upon to clean, so that an appropriate solution can be applied which will not only maintain cleanliness, but also preserve the surface of the area.

The problems of infection control brings the housekeeping directly into the centre of professional activity within the hospital. Most bacteria can be found on the walls or in the air and the housekeepers must understand which bacteria they are called upon to

Defends Extension

Education Minister William Davis of Ontario had defended his decision to extend the high school teaching year to June 13, but also announced some summer holidays earlier.

Students will start their summer holidays earlier because of administrative problems in their schools. He said he was bowing to arguments from teachers and administrators and not yielding to complaints from

students about the added difficulty of finding summer jobs. In most schools final examinations will start after June 13.

The Ontario government has postponed expansion at three medical teaching centres and may halt construction plans at seven others because the government can't afford them. "We had to pull the string on them because we

haven't the funds to build them and we don't know when we will have," said Stanley Martin, chairman of the Ontario Hospital Service Commission. Two projects in Toronto and one in Belleville are affected immediately.

Other expansion projects that may be delayed later are three in Toronto, two in London and one each at Kingston and Ottawa. A federal cutback in cost-sharing with the province for hospital construction is responsible for the delays, Mr. Martin said.

A second printing of Judy LaMarsh's memoirs is nearly sold out in advance and a third printing has been ordered, a spokesman for publishers McClelland and Stewart Ltd., said in Toronto.

Scott McIntyre, manager of advertising and promotion, said the first printing of the former state secretary's book, Judy LaMarsh: Memoirs of a Bird in a Gilded Cage, was sold out to bookstores before its publication date.

An employee in the sales department said the second printing already is nearly covered by orders and third printing has been set for early February.

The book costs \$7.95 a copy. Printing figures were not disclosed, but Mr. McIntyre said the first printing "was exceptionally large for a Canadian publishing" and the second and third also will be large.
