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Editorial Comment

Inheritance Tax A Burden

Small businesses may be on their way out if Finance Minister Benson gets his way. His proposed legislation to change the Estate Tax Act may make the burden of trying to pay off inheritance tax by second generation heirs almost an impossibility.

In fact this will be true if a property in an estate is valued as low as \$20,000 because this is the proposed minimum figure before taxes start under the new Act.

Mr. Benson said: "I can agree the inheritance tax might accelerate the scale of the family business or the family farm." This really means most people who inherit a small business of farm won't be able to operate it because they won't be able to keep the property. They will have to sell to get enough money to pay off the tax. This brings up the question of who will be the buyers of all this property? It certainly would have to be people of firms with large amounts of cash at the ready such as large corporations.

Mr. Benson said he is making the proposed changes to raise \$200 million for the government treasury. But at the same time large corporations are taxed at much lower rate. The reason for this, it is said, is because this helps to keep companies growing and helps to create more jobs.

It would seem to me small businesses also create a lot of jobs. This gives the big corporations a real chance to gobble up small family business competition.

We urge our readers to take a very close look at the proposal. See where it might leave you if something should happen to the bread winner in your family. See what it will do to your son's dream if he has been working at your side knowing that he will inherit the family farm some day. Also remember that estate taxes are tax on tax because all money accumulated by any family has been taxed as it was earned.

Congratulations

We congratulate Reeve Ernest Craddock of Jarvis on his successful election to the wardenship of Haldimand. Mr. Craddock has a long and outstanding record of activities in municipal office of this community. He served as a councillor during the 1959 term and has served since 1961 as Reeve of the village. He is also in his ninth term as a member of Haldimand County Council.

On this council he has been a member of all four of its major committees such as finance, administration, roads and the home committee for Grand View Lodge.

Mr. Craddock has guided the town through many a crisis. The major one was the financial crisis that developed after the installation of sewer and water services in this community. With perseverance, good will and a sense of humor he was able to guide Jarvis over the hurdle.

With his experience on both the Jarvis and County councils he will be able to add a great deal to the orderly development of this community in view of the new developments to the south.

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
